Carleton Place.—Robinson—That the clerk be instructed to write the Minister of Fisheries and Lands, Ottawa, regarding his (the Minister's) attention to the unsafe condition of the bridge over the Trent Valley Canal, on 3rd con. Eldon at Belvoir.

McFadyen-Ross.—That the clerk be authorized to order copies of "The Municipal World" to be sent to each of the following: Reeve, each Councillor, Clerk and Assessor—Carleton.

On motion of Ross and Robinson, a large number of accounts were passed and the Reeve instructed to issue orders on the Treasurer therefor.

Council adjourned to meet in Plank's hall, Lorneville, on Saturday, February 23 at 11 a.m.

First meeting of Council was held at the township hall, Victoria Road, on January 14. Members present, Reeve, F. C. Fielding, Councillors Isaac J. Bowins, Joseph H. Black, James Bell and Joseph W. Lytle. Declarations all made and subscribed. Correspondence was read from the Ontario Municipal Association copy of petition to Legislature to repeal Section 606. From the Hospital for Sick Children, soliciting a charity grant.

The following motions were passed:

Lytle-Bowins—That petition be signed and forwarded to J. H. Carnegie, M.P.P., for presentation to the Legislature.

Bell-Black—That a charity grant of \$5 be given to Hospital for Sick Children, and that the Clerk be paid cost of election, \$15.

Lytle-Bowins—That James S. Black and T. C. Birchard be Auditors.

Bell-Black—That Arthur Peel be assessor and be paid \$60.

Lytle-Bowins—That Joseph H. Black be a member of the Board of Health for three years.

Bell-Lytle—That Dr. Grant be appointed Medical Health Officer.

The Clerk was instructed to write P. J. Lynch, Assistant Superintendent G.T.R., complaints of passengers standing in the cold and no shelter, station always lacked at Corson's siding.

Lytle-Black—That the pound-keepers be John Armour, Edward Dalyn, Dan Smith and Martin Long.

Fenceviewers and pathmasters were appointed.

Time for collecting the taxes was extended to the 1st of February.

The Clerk's salary was raised from \$70 to \$75. He promised not to bother the Council in future. One copy of the Municipal World was ordered.

Meeting then adjourned to meet in March at Victoria Road.

Moved by Mr. Maconochie, seconded by Mr. Davis, that the Council comply with the request of the Municipal Association re section 606 of the Municipal Act, and that a petition be signed by the Reeve and forwarded to Mr. Carnegie for presentation. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Rumney, seconded by Mr. Carew, that the Council grant \$10 to the Hospital for Sick Children. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Carew, seconded by Mr. Rumney, that Messrs. Maconochie By-law to ratify By-law No. 5 of the Police Trustees of the Police Village Kinmount, be now read and passed. Carried. By-law read and passed.

Moved by Mr. Rumney, seconded by Mr. Carew, that not more than \$100 be spent in bonusing wire fences during 1907, and that not more than 20 cents per rod be paid for fences having not less than eight lateral wires. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Carew, seconded by Mr. Rumney that Messrs. Maconochie and Davis inspect the place where Mr. N. Wilson proposes to erect a wire fence and report as to giving a bonus. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Carew, seconded by Mr. Davis, that the Reeve and Treasurer be instructed to withdraw \$5,000 from the Victoria Loan Company and deposit same in the Bank of Montreal, to the credit of the municipality.

Moved by Mr. Carew, seconded by Mr. Maconochie, that the Reeve and Mr. Rumney examine the place where C. Smithson proposes erecting a wire fence, and report as to bonusing same. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Carew, seconded by Mr. Davis, that the Treasurer be instructed to renew bonds. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Carew, seconded by Mr. Maconochie, that the clerk have minutes of Council published in at least one Lindsay paper. Carried.

\$55,000,000 FOR JAP ARMY.
Tokio, Jan. 10.—Certain details of the budget for 1907-8 were learned to-day. A total of \$55,000,000 is provided for army expenditure. This includes the formation of four new divisions. The navy is allotted \$40,000,000, including \$5,500,000, which is to be devoted to increasing the efficiency of the service. New undertakings in the development of communications are to be met by an internal loan of \$15,000,000.

next fiscal year will balance at \$305,500,000. The financial prospects of the country are regarded as very bright.

It is stated upon authority that, although four new army divisions are being organized, drastic curtailments in this branch will be effected by the projected reorganization of the field artillery, the quick-firing batteries and the cavalry.

VARIATIONS IN SEPARATOR CREAM.

The Kansas Experiment station has been trying to find out the causes of the variations in the test of separator cream. In a bulletin published recently by the station it is explained that a cream separator is naturally warmer in the summer than it is in the winter, and consequently

during the winter months the first milk entering the bowl is cooled several degrees. Then, too, the milk cools off quickly while standing in the cold weather, and is usually separated at a lower temperature in winter very noticeable. The chief cause of this is in summer. This is only a gradual variation, however, and is not variation in each case as follows:

1. The temperature of the milk makes a difference of from one to five per cent. in the test of cream at average skimming temperature, greater variation being caused in extreme cases.
2. The amount of flush water used with average skimming temperatures makes a difference of from one to three per cent., in extreme cases making a difference as great as ten per cent.
3. The variation in steadiness of the bowl makes a difference of from two to sixteen per cent. depending on the amount of vibration.
4. The variation of the speed of the bowl causes a difference of from one to thirteen per cent. in the test of cream.
5. The amount of milk allowed to flow through the separator bowl from one-half to full capacity makes a difference of from one to six per cent.
6. The amount of acid in the milk causes an irregular variation in the test of cream. When the acid reaches a high point, .8 to .4 per cent. for instance, and the separator is used continuously for an hour or more, it will eventually clog as in the case of cold milk. The cream will then become thicker until the separator is entirely clogged. The extent of the clogging will depend on the amount of acid in the milk and the size of the machine.
