THE LIQUOR TRAFFIC SEVERELY DENOUNCED

SERMON BY REV. DR. BISHOP, PASTOR OF CAMBRIDGE STREET METHODIST CHURCH ADVISES AGITATION FOR LOCAL OPTION.

At the Cambridge street Methodist church on Sunday evening the pastor, Rev. Dr. Bishop, preached on the liquor question, and severely denounced the liquor traffic. He also advised the politicians on both sides though he gave the present treatment of Ontario credit for their enforcement of the liquor law that had existed previously. He took for his text Psalm 115, 20: "Shall the throne of iniquity have fellowship with thee, which frameth mischief by a law?" The Psalmist, he said, in this Psalm makes an appeal against those who oppress the people. All the time these oppressors thought they did not take account of their wrongs. The Psalmist called hard names, designated the oppressors brutish and foolish because they thought God took no notice. He makes an appeal to them to turn away from their iniquity. To the speaker this Psalm had always been associated with the oppression of the liquor traffic. How long will men, he asked, allow the iniquity, oppression and injustice of that traffic to exist. Matthew Henry says those who sang this Psalm looked abroad and saw injustice and looked forward to seeing the injustice abolished. The speaker did not wish to say hard things, but it was difficult to repress indignation in regard to the abolishment of the traffic by God himself. Just as sure as the shackles were stricken off the slaves, so sure would the liquor traffic be destroyed.

Mischief in the text meant calamity. Gladstone had said that the evils of the liquor traffic exceeded those of war, pestilence and famine combined. We were horrified at the calamity in Jamaica, and by the accounts of the famine in China,

telling us that people were eating their own flesh and that of their children, and yet we sit still while the evils of the liquor traffic are such. In the Legislature it has frequently been stated that it is the cause of three-fourths of all the crime in our land. Justice Colborne, of England, had declared the prisons would be comparatively empty but for the liquor traffic. It is the cause of 80 per cent. of all the lunacy, 40 per cent. of the idleness, and 10 per cent. of all the deaths from all causes in our land. It destroys the moral sense, weakens the will power, desecrates the home, and desecrates even the precincts of God's house. It is the most seductive devilized form of evil in existence.

Proceeding, the speaker said the traffic was perpetuated by the operation of law. The traffic controlled the law makers of this land. It always had done so. It held by the throat both political parties. It was authorized, perpetuated and protected by the law of the land. Not long since a deputation of liquor sellers waited on the Provincial Government and stated that they were engaged in a legitimate business and demanded the protection of their rights. The principle of license recognizes the evil of the traffic. It should not be tolerated in any Christian country. The Government had passed a law authorizing municipalities to protect themselves against the traffic, yet had put into that law a violation of one of the principles of our constitution by giving the power to perpetuate the evil. Is it too strong to say, he asked, that the minority has been given power in the moral realm. All the while with the liquor traffic. It was a wonder that any Government would tolerate this. It was said that a 60 per cent. vote was necessary to have the law enforced. The very administration that passed this law had shown that the enforcement did not depend on that size of the majority. They had given the best enforcement of the law that we had had for years. He gave them credit for that. It was something we had not had previously. Formerly it was well known there was laxity in regard to the enforcement of the law.

"Shall the throne of iniquity hold

fellowship with thee?" Some try to make God responsible. The very suggestion was repulsive. Men may be responsible. Churches have held fellowship with the traffic. He was glad to say that all the evangelical churches in this land had declared against the traffic. In the list of shareholders of the Guinness' Brewery Company, in England, there were 178 with the prefix Rev. In four other concerns 188 ministers were shareholders. They had read that in Kingston where licenses were to be reduced the hotelkeepers demanded that the first to be cut off should be one from which four ministers derived a revenue. These cases however, were exceptions.

Shall the throne of iniquity have fellowship with the state? It has had it, and he feared it would have it for some time.

The speaker said he now came to the vital question, shall the liquor traffic have fellowship with you? "Shall I," he asked, "by my vote uphold it, or shall I be my vote do my utmost for its destruction?" The man that does not do the latter is responsible for, and in fellowship

with this iniquity. It was a matter of congratulation that the people had so often pronounced against it, and that their trust they would obey the mandate of the people.

Speaking of the recent local option contests, he said, that 48 out of 103 municipalities had given 60 per cent. and over in favor, and 78 homes would be cut off. In 12 the majority were from 6 to 60 per cent., and only 13 was there a majority against involving 36 licenses. These majorities were only from 1 to 74. How utterly unjust, claimed the speaker, that municipalities giving majorities should be prevented from adopting the measure. It should raise such a storm of indignation as would compel fair play.

The time had come, he thought, for the people of Lindsay to organize to carry this law. He was not sufficiently acquainted with the conditions to say whether it would take one or five or ten years to carry it. He was sure however that action should be taken until public sentiment was sufficiently advanced, but it was time to begin to pray and agitate. He did not come much in contact with the liquor traffic. This church was little affected. Should we sit still because it did not touch us? The churches should begin to agitate. We had been in every fight against license, and had had some very bad charges made against him. In Aurora it was reported that he had been so drunk at a fire that he had to be carried home.

He had commenced the fight thirty years ago, and then looked for prohibition in five years. Why had he been so hopeful in who believed the food he ate was poisoned, and the platform. Some of the men who owed their political elevation to the profession of temperance principles had proved false. The traffic was hard to kill, still we should do all we could against it. If only all we felt we could do to continue to fight against it. He had seven boys in this land, and had felt the dangers to which they had been exposed. One thing he wished to emphasize to the members of this church was to organize to pray for the men in the traffic, that they may quit it, and that it may be put into the hearts of the people to destroy the traffic.

A temperance prayer meeting was held after the service.

FARM NOTES

Dipping hogs is very essential to the health of the animal. It keeps them free of mites and scab diseases, makes them more thrifty and consequently more profitable. Dipping should be done twice each year. Falling dipping, a wash of tobacco water will prove beneficial.

Six new cow-testing associations have recently been organized in Eastern Ontario by the Dairy Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture. It is pleasant to note the development of this work. If you are interested in who is being done at Ottawa, for information as to the organization of an association in your section.

A live turkey, apparently healthy, sold in New York during Christmas time, according to New York Herald, but when killed it was found to have white spots on the heart and lungs. The case was taken to the Health Department, and Drs. Whalen and Biehoff of the City Laboratory reported the turkey to have been in the last stages of consumption.

Fowls will vary considerably in their preferences for different foods, says Farm Poultry. With dry wash food before them all the time one is safe in feeding the other articles a little short, for the fowls cannot suffer for want of food, but generally speaking it is good policy to be liberal with all feeds, and if you find the fowls are not cleaning up your feed until they catch up or come to their appetites.

Officially authenticated testing of dairy cows is becoming more and more the leading feature of the work of New York breeders, says a correspondent of the American Agriculturist. These tests are required by the pulp and the true index of the value, and of the capacity of all breeds. Practical dairymen are placing absolute reliance upon them as an invaluable aid in the selection of sires with which certainly to improve the capacity and profitable production of their cows.

LEISURE TIME IN THE WINTER. Some suggestions for the employment of the farmer's leisure time during mid-winter are given by Country Gentleman. There are numerous reports about the house and barn that are being done, but for such as have no other business, the following are suggested: 1. The poultry houses are to be kept clean; an open winter leaves no excuse for having manure standing round the buildings. There are a few things that will pay better than sitting round the stove or loafing in the village store.

GREAT HOLSTEIN RECORDS. During December 108 Holstein cows were tested for seven days. This herd of 108 animals, of which one-half were heifers with first or second calves, produced in seven consecutive days 80,438 lbs. milk, containing 1,950 1-8 lbs. of butter-fat; showing an average of 9.45 per cent. fat. The average yield for each animal was 888 lbs. milk, containing 18,197 lbs. of butter-fat; equivalent to 54.7 lbs. or 26 quarts milk per day, and 15.4 lbs. of the best of creamery butter per week. These averages are the third highest yet recorded for the Holstein breed, and are such as no other breed has even approached. In the aged cow class, Neel Pauline DeKol leads, with 204 lbs. fat from 594.6 lbs. milk. In the junior four-year-old class Lady Wayne Johanna made nearly 19 lbs. fat from 890 lbs. milk in seven days, and 794 lbs. fat from 2,506 lbs. milk in thirty days.

CANADIAN BACON IN GREAT BRITAIN. Last year was not a bumper year for Canadian bacon trade in Great Britain, says P. D. MacNamara, Commercial Agent at Manchester, England, in the Weekly Report on

Canadian trade and commerce. During the first half of the year Canadian bacon held its own amongst numerous competitors, and came out very little behind its principal rivals Irish and Danish. Since August supplies of Canadian bacon have been meagre, owing to scarcity of hogs and unusually high prices. If Canadian bacon is to maintain its position on the British market, shipments must be more liberal, Mr. MacNamara says. English merchants look hopefully to the time when Canada can produce more hogs. The quality of Canadian bacon is uniformly good. The feeding of hogs, the selection of bacon, the mildness of the cure, could not be improved.

Twenty-five Thousand of New Settlers for Canada Under S. A. Auspices

As a successful immigration agency the Salvation Army has come into great prominence, and during the past four years about twenty thousand people have been directed to this country through the agency of this world-wide organization. Sixty per cent. of these have been placed in Ontario, 30 per cent. in the North-West, and the remainder in Quebec and the Maritime Provinces.

Thirteen thousand persons came to Canada under the auspices of the Army last year, and were selected from a possible one hundred thousand applicants. These figures are an indication that great discretion is used in the selection. During the coming season, 1907, it is estimated that fully 25,000 persons will avail themselves of the Army's Emigration facilities, and book passages to Canada. The entire accommodation of three steamers has been chartered for the season, besides all available accommodation on Dominion, Allan and C.P.R. Steamship Lines.

The majority of the new-comers will be available for engagement as farm laborers, teamsters, navvies, quarrymen, railway construction workers, factory and general laborers, and farmers and others desiring the services of some will be well to apply to Brigadier Howell, James and Albert streets, Toronto, for application forms.

If house accommodation can be furnished, married men with growing families are specially recommended as being more permanent and stable. Farmers are recommended to apply for married men when possible.

Got to the Wrong Franklin

A Pole landed at Franklin, in Durham County one night last week. It appears he had been working in Pittsburg, Pa., and decided to visit his brother at Franklin, Manitoba. Not being familiar with the geography of Canada he asked the railway agent at Pittsburg for a ticket to Franklin, Canada, and was given one for Franklin, Ont. He was in a bad plight on arrival, having little money, not sufficient to take him back to Pittsburg. The proprietor of the hotel at Bethany took pity on him and kept him over night. By a subscription list sufficient money was raised to take the man back to Pittsburg.

A deputation from Peterborough succeeded in securing from the Hon. H. R. Emmerson, Minister of Railways, and Canals, a promise that if the City Council made a request by resolution the Ontario Power Commission should supply the city with power from Dam No. 5 at 800 horse power per year, their rights would be safeguarded.

Peterborough Industrial Exhibition may be abandoned. The annual meeting was called on the 16th, but there were not enough present to form a quorum.
