Sweeping Gains For Local Option

The complete result of the battle at the polls Monday against the bar will not be known for a day or two. A summary at 1 o'clock this morning shows 41 licenses cut off by the necessary three-fifths majority; 55 licenses against which a majority was cast, but which are saved by the three-fifths clause; and 40 licenses, chiefly in towns, such as Woodstock, Trenton, Morrisburg, Tillsonburg and Point Edward, saved by a majority vote against local option.

The townships generally voted for local option, and as quite a few of them are still to be heard from there is little doubt that the number of licenses cut off will be not less than sixty. If to this are added the seven ordered to be cut off in St. Catharines and the 40 ordered to be cut off in Toronto, the net result of the campaign will be the closing of over 100 bars on May 1st.

The most remarkable feature of the vote yesterday was the refusal of the electors to repeat local option in any important town in which it had been tried. The greatest interest centred around the Owen Sound and Grimsby battles. In Owen Sound the majority against repeal was 193, and in Grimsby 31. Three years ago Owen Sound gave 476 majority for local option, and Grimsby 29.

There were 6,100 licensed places in Ontario 35 years ago. The return for 1907, the last complete statement, showed 2,474. It is probable that in the license year 1909-10 they will not greatly exceed 2,000, while of the municipalities over 210 will be under local option. The result:

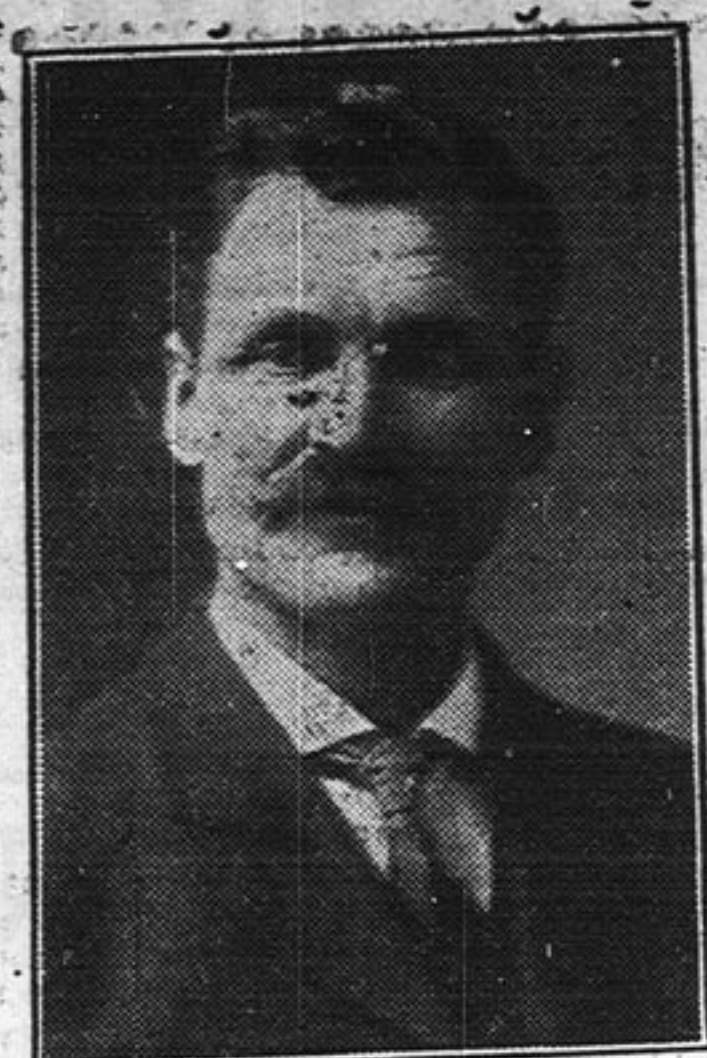
A SPRIG OF MISTLETOE.

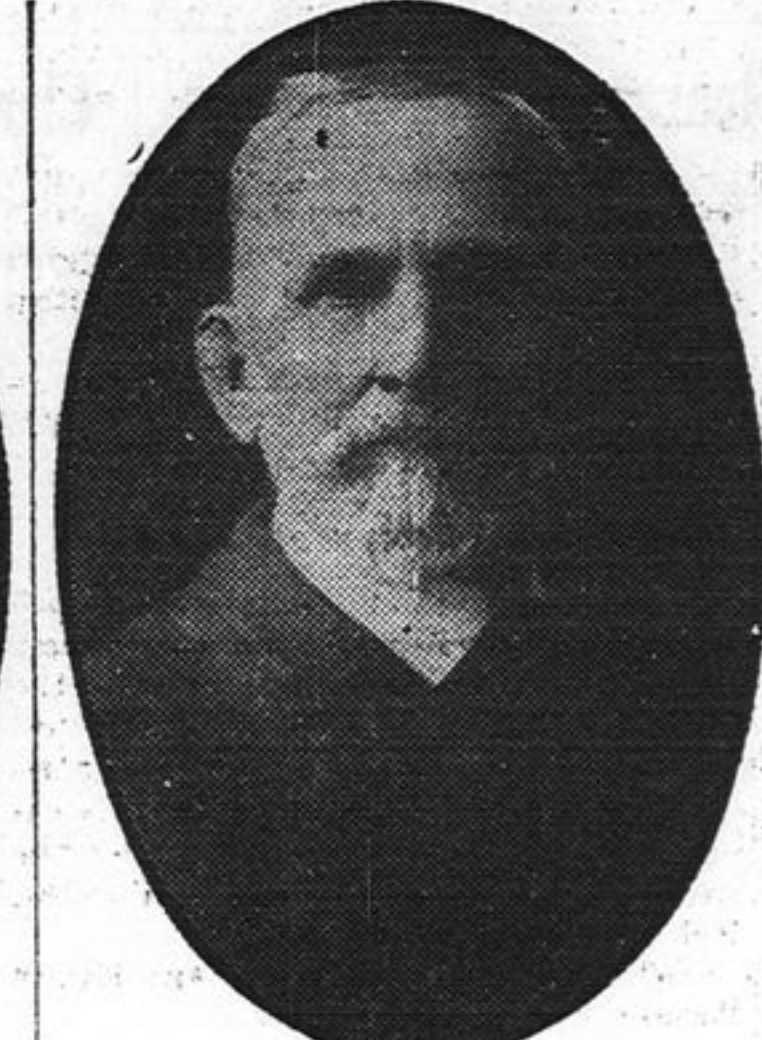

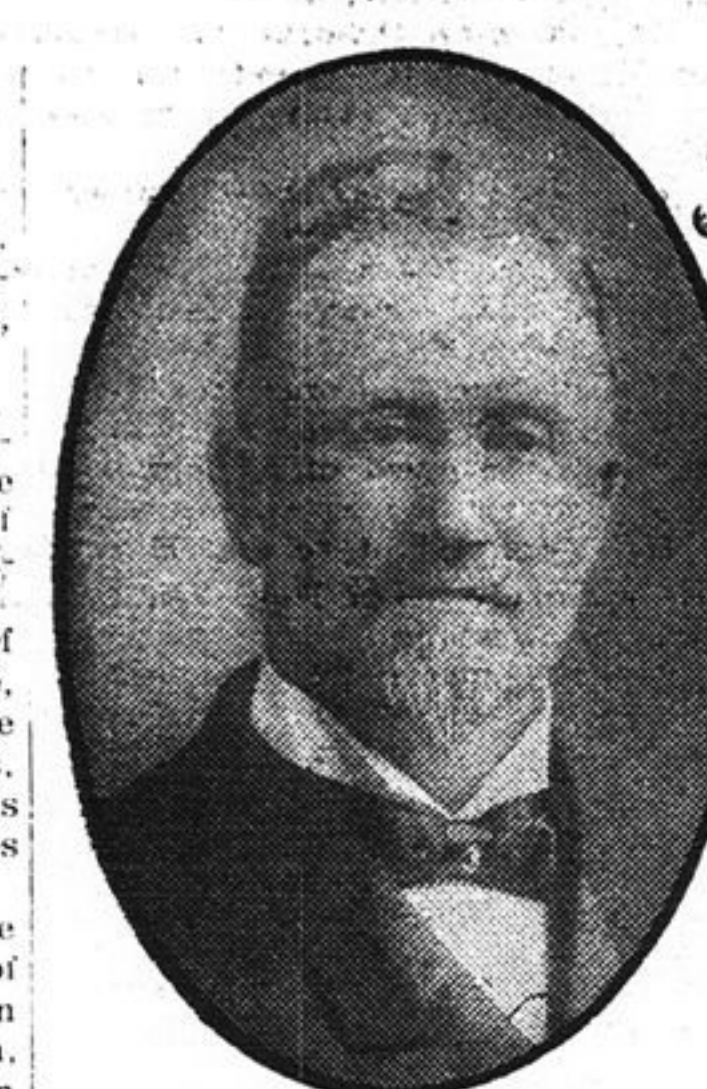

As the result of the municipal elections held Monday the above gentlemen will act as the town of Lindsay's legislators during the ensuing year, 1909. Yesterday was not the best kind of a day for getting out a large vote, as the weather turned soft and the sleighing was very poor in places, but nevertheless a good vote was polled, probably over 7,500 votes were cast for the various offices.

The elections on the whole were tame compared with the elections of past years. The mayor was given his second term, as is the custom, and the good work of Reeve Jordan was undisputed with the result that they were unopposed and returned by acclamation.

There were only eight candidates in the field for aldermanic honors, and as seven were to be elected, the fight was not as keen as in former years. All the members of last year's council, who were seeking re-election were again decided upon by the people as the proper guardians of the town's welfare. Mr. M. J. Lewis, and Mr. A. C. Babcock headed the poll. They are both new men and received a splendid vote. Messrs. Dobson and Calvert, from the east ward, received good votes in the east and south wards. Ald. Campbell polled an average vote in every ward. Messrs. Devitt and Kyle tied for seventh place on the first count last evening, but when the votes received were recounted this morning it was found that Mr. Hawkins had more votes than Mr. Devitt, and consequently Mr. Devitt is the defeated candidate. Mr. Hawkins received a splendid support in the north ward, and fairly good in the other wards, and considering that he was practically unknown, did well. He has had experience and should make good. The many friends of Mr. Devitt regret his defeat, but everybody can't win.

FIRST DEPUTY-REEVE. Two exceedingly close and keen contests were fought for the first and second Deputy-Reeveships. Messrs. B. L. McLean and ex-Deputy-Reeve Eyres were in the field for the First Deputy, and the supporters of both gentlemen worked hard all day bringing in the votes. When the returns

were being received at the town clerk's office Mr. Eyres was ahead until the last two or three polling booths were heard from, then Mr. McLean forged ahead. Mr. Eyres secured a large vote in the north ward, but Mr. McLean beat him out in the south and east wards, especially the latter. Mr. McLean will make a valuable acquisition to the council, and the valuable service of ex-Deputy-Reeve Eyres will be missed. Mr. Eyres was an efficient servant of the town, and yesterday's defeat was the first he has suffered in six years.

SECOND DEPUTY-REEVE. The contest for Second Deputy-Reeve between Messrs. McGeough and W. Jordan, was very keen and spirited, and the successful candidate was not decided until the last count was in, as a result Mr. Jordan was shown to be ahead by the exceedingly small majority of four votes. The north ward went strong for Mr. Jordan, as also did two divisions of the south, but Mr. McGeough received a heavy vote in the south ward and also in the east ward. Both gentlemen served very efficiently as aldermen during the past year and Mr. McGeough will be missed on the council.

WATER COMMISSIONER. The contest between Mr. J. D. Flavelle and Mr. John Duke for Water Commissioner, was all one-sided and resulted in an overwhelming victory for the former, who was elected by 649 of a majority. Mr. Duke received his strongest support in the east ward. This result, however, was looked for, as the general opinion was that Mr. Flavelle was the right man for the position and he received the almost unanimous support of the ratepayers.

How Islay, Alberta, Came by Its Name

Many have heard the name of the little village, Islay, Alberta, and wondered at its origination. Oftentimes it has been confused with the village in Victoria county but few guessed that there was a connection between the two places.

Mr. Duncan Gilchrist, of Islay, Alberta, while in conversation with a Warden man this morning, explained how the Alberta hamlet came by its name. With the influx of Eastern Canadians to the Western part of the Dominion, many have forsaken this country. About a dozen families from around the village of Islay, Ont., twelve miles north of Lindsay, 'trekked' west and formed a settlement. Memories of earlier days still lingered with them and for 'old acquaintance' sake they called the village thus formed, Islay.

Mr. Gilchrist has been in the West for three years and is on a three months visit home. He is delighted with the country out there. The climate is fine and the land, rolling prairie and excellent farming land. The village of Islay has a population of about \$200. Among Victoria county folks who have settled there during the last two years and are prospering are John A. McFadden, N. McEachern, A. McMillan and Geo. Wilson.

A TIE IN OPS. The elections in the township of Ops were keenly contested, especially for the reeveship between Messrs. Peter Hawkins and W. H. Wilson. The latter gentleman being reeve during 1908. The supporters of both gentlemen worked hard, with the result that when the count was finally made, it was discovered that both were tied for the position of reeve. Clerk O'Boyle after deliberating decided to cast his final vote in favor of Mr. Wilson, and accordingly Mr. Wilson was declared reeve. Two years ago a similar incident occurred, when Mr. Hawkins and Mr. Post were running, and the vote decided in favor of Mr. Hawkins.
