According to the story handed down in his family, the human head kept in kis house, in silk wrappings inside an oak box black with age, was that of the Protec-X tor, and was secured by a soldier, who saw it blown down from the roof of Westminster Hall in a storm.

The soldier's family sold it to the Russels, connections of the Cromwell family, and it descended to Samuel Russell, a showman. He exhibited the head, it is said, at a charge of 2s. 6d. a person, and after sold it to a rival showman. After passing I finally acquired by Mr. Wilkinson's grandfather.
