The question of the adaptation and enrichment of the prayer book the Church of England in Canada at the present time being laid fore the clergy of the Dominion, wi a view to obtaining the concensus of opinion upon proposed changes, and also with a view to obtaining suggestions as to its revision.

A committee of the general synod under the chairmanship of the Primate of Canada and the vice-chairmanship of the Lord Bishop of Huron has prepared a large number questions which the clergy are quested to answer, and this is now being done.

Certain limitations have been posed by the general synod which are to the eject that no change is to be made in either text or rubric, which will involve or imply a change Set of Furs of doctrine or of principle; to make out such changes as are necessary to meet the requirements of the Church of England in Canada, and to keep within the lines of the resolutions of the Lambeth conference of 1908. The principles laid down by that English conf. rence were that there should be an adaptation of rubrics to present customs as generally accepted, the omission of parts of the service to obviate repetition or redundancy, additions to present services, provision of alternatives in the form of public worship and other minor

There are in all seventeen questions asked and a number of suggestions made which the committee desire the opinion of the clergy upon.

The documents are to reach the secretary, Rev. Dean Bidwell, of Kingston, Ont., by the end of this month.
