CHICAGO, Jan. 18.—In spite of a boggy that great quantities of Canadian wheat in bond would be used by Minneapolis mills to fill export orders, the wheat market to-day wound up at a net advance. Closing prices were 1-3c and 1-4c to 3-8c higher than last night. Strong interests took all offerings and brought about a rise. Corn finished 1-4c to 3-8c up, oats at a gain of 1-4c to 3-8c, and hog products varying from 1-2c to 5c decline to 2 1-2c additional cost.

The Liverpool market closed to-day on wheat 3d to 3d higher than yesterday. Corn unchanged to 3d higher. Buenos Aires wheat was 1/2c to 5c higher, and corn 3/4c to 5c higher. Paris wheat closed 3/4c to 1/2c higher. Amvex unchanged. Berlin 1/2c lower. Budapest 1/2c higher.

Montreal Grain and Produce.
MONTREAL, Jan. 18.—Owing to the renewed unfavorable crop news from the Argentine there was an improved demand from foreign buyers for Manitoba spring wheat in prices of 48c to 49c for No. 34 per quarter, and sales of a few loads were made. There was also a better demand for No. 34 for export for May, June, and engagements were made to London at 2s 6d and to Bristol at 2s 3d. The demand for oats from European sources continues good, and further sales were made to Belfast and Dublin. The local trade in oats is fairly active at firm prices.

There was a fair enquiry from European sources for spring wheat flour, but as the bids in most cases were 3d per sack lower than a week ago, only a small business was worked. A fair business was done on spot at firm prices. Demand for bran and shorts is good, of which supplies are small. Cheese is firm, but business is quiet, as the bulk of the stock for butter is good, and the market is fairly active, with a strong upward tendency. Eggs active and strong.
