A novel and somewhat astonishing explanation of the inflaences ?ontributing to the high cost of living is contained in the above interrogations and suggested to a Toronto newspaper reporter Wednesday in an terview with a prominent produce merchant of this city, Mr. H. Clemes, manager of the Front-st. branch of Gunns, Limited, formerly of Lindsay.

The periods of heavy production and light production of farm praduce, including eggs and butter, which are the staples, have clear lines of distinction in the minds the producers themselves and wholesalers. This particular period of the year is known as that of light production, when the demand seems to outstrip the supply by wide margin, if the prices the people of this city are called upon to pay for their butter, eggs and meats have any significance. Curious to say, Mr. Clemes told the reporter tha just because this was a period light production it was a time which it was unfair to pass the ruling prices of foodstuffs under censure. The reason he gives is that the law of supply and demand does not obtain in this period to the same degree of effectiveness that it idoes in a period of plenty. But, he went on to explain, another influence rules tor.' in the place of the old reliable law The plutocrats usurp the authority of the law of supply and demand and it is to them, he thinks, that should be attributed the troubles the less wealthy people have in meeting their


