MILITIA CONFERENCE. Ottawa, Dec. 29.—The Minister of Militia, Col. the Hon. Sam Hughes, has arranged for a general conference of militia officers representing all parts of the Dominion and all branches of the service, to be held at the Parliament buildings here at the time of the annual meeting of the Dominion Rifle Association in February. The conference will be similar to the one held a year ago, with a view to a general discussion of the needs of the service from the standpoint of practical efficiency, and to enable the headquarters staff to get in closer touch with the actual requirements of the militia as voiced by the representatives of the different corps at the conference. It is the intention of the Minister to call his officers annually for consultation and advice with the headquarters staff.

An attempt which can only be characterized as uncandid, has been made by a section of the Liberal press to create the impression that Borden's attitude on the navy question, while in opposition was different from the position taken by Borden when in office. Let any candid man of whatever political party read that speech and compare what Borden promised when in opposition with what Borden has done when in power and he must be convinced that what Borden promised Borden has fulfilled and not in any grudging and perfunctory manner, but loyally in the spirit of the promise. On the other hand let any candid man compare Laurier's little voided promise with Laurier's little fulfillment and he must be convinced that a maximum of promise has gone with a minimum of fulfillment and that the mean achievement has killed the spirit of the grandiloquent promise. No, it is not Borden's inconsistency, but Laurier's insincerity that the country has to fear.

SPECIAL AROUND THE WORLD CRUISE.

CANADIAN PACIFIC EMPRESSES OF "RUSSIA" AND "ASIA." The most direct connection to make for the sailing from Liverpool April 1st is via "Empress of Britain" from St. John, N.B., March 21st, 1913. The Canadian Pacific Atlantic Empresses are so well known and have established such an excellent reputation for safety, speed, service and accommodation, that when we say the "Empress of Russia" and "Empress of Asia" are larger and faster than the "Empress of Britain" and "Empress of Ireland," it means a great deal. The rate for the entire cruise is \$339.10 exclusive of maintenance before arrival in England and departure of the "Empress of Russia."

A similar cruise will be made by the "Empress of Asia" sailing from Liverpool May 27th, 1913.
