## Vast Toll of Men and Money To Carry on War Five Months

At the end of the old year foreign statisticians computed that the five months of the greatest war of history had cost the nations involved 6,000,000 men (killed, wounded and captured) and \$7,000,000,000. These figures are sub-divided as follows:

**LOSSES.**  
Great Britain—800 officers killed, 4,000 wounded; men, 15,000 killed, 25,000 wounded, 25,000 missing.  
France—Total casualties, 1,100,000, of whom 180,000 have been killed.  
Russia—Total casualties, 1,800,000, of whom 250,000 have been killed.  
Germany—30,000 killed, 58,000 wounded, 35,000 captured.  
Serbia—Total casualties, 270,000; said by Austria to have been captured, 80,000.  
Italy—250,000 killed, 850,000 wounded, 400,000 missing.  
Austria—Total casualties, 1,500,000, of whom 1,000,000 have been killed.

**EXPENSE.**  
Great Britain—\$225,000,000 a month, or \$1,125,000,000 at the end of five months.  
France—\$300,000,000 a month, a total of \$1,500,000,000.  
Russia—\$350,000,000 a month, a total of \$1,750,000,000.  
Germany—\$300,000,000 a month, a total of \$1,500,000,000 at home, in addition to paying the expenses of her ally Turkey.  
Austria—Estimated to total \$1,000,000,000.  
In addition, all the warring nations are said to have lost perhaps as much as they have spent by the paralyzation of commerce and industry. owing to this tremendous cost, financial authorities say that the war must end within the next five months.

It was the occasion of the annual banquet of the officers and will go down into the history of the 45th as a red-letter event. It was a genial, happy crew of officers who gathered on the invitation of the gallant young Colonel, and a most delightful evening was spent. Officers were present from Omamee, Tory Hill, Bobcaygeon, Kinmount, and other outlying districts, and, needless to say, they thoroughly enjoyed the banquet and the evening's entertainment.

About 9.30 o'clock, following the annual meeting of the officers held in the Armouries, Colonel Fee's guests repaired to the Hotel Simpson to partake of the banquet. **VEGETABLE**—Mashed potatoes, boiled potatoes, June peas, wax beans, creamed corn.  
**RELISHES**—Anchovy sauce, mixed pickles, green pickles, horseradish, Worcestershire sauce, punch sauce, tomato catsup.  
**PASTRY**—Lemon meringue pie, homemade mince pie.  
**DESSERT**—New Year's plum pudding, brandy sauce, Creme a la Tampoico, cake assorted, crackers and cheese, tea, coffee, oranges, bananas, apples, layer raisins, nuts assorted, cafe noir, cafe au lait, Stilton cheese, Roquefort cheese.

## THE LATE ALEXANDER PATRICK DEVLIN

The late Alexander Patrick Devlin, county and country now for close on 41 years in that official capacity, and passing away out of office with a spotless reputation and as leader to the profession which he so cleverly pursued.  
Mr. Devlin was a most successful student, carrying off many scholarships at Osgoode Hall during his course of studies. He was looked upon by those who knew him best to be a gentleman of scholarly attainments, broad judgment, a close friend and a heart filled with charity for the afflicted and love for mankind. A more noble spirit could scarce possess one individual than that which took up its abode in the manhood of Alexander Patrick Devlin, who was the whole and entirety of what might be termed the price of good men. He was a grand entertainer and time spent in his company sped rapidly and pleasantly away.

In the year 1895 he married Miss Teresa Adelaide Duck, youngest daughter of the late Patrick Duck of this town.  
The funeral took place on Thursday, Jan. 7, from his late residence, 19 St. Lawrence-st., to St. Mary's R. C. church, where a requiem high mass was celebrated by Rev. Msgr. Casey. The church was well filled with people of all denominations who assembled to pay their last respects to the deceased. The cortege to the cemetery was followed by a large number of friends and citizens in sleighs and walking. The pall-bearers were: His Honor Judge McMillan, Senator McHugh, Messrs. B. J. Gough, L. V. O'Connor, P. J. Breen and F. D. Moore, K.C.

Mr. Devlin is survived by his bereaved wife and one brother, Dr.-J. A. Devlin, M.D., of Napanee.  
A bouquet with the words from "The Lindsay Bar," in gold letters on lace, was presented by the loyal profession, with several spiritual bouquets from friends.

Mr. Devlin was called to the bar of Upper Canada in March, 1868. After receiving his diploma, which entitled him to plead before the bar he opened practice of his profession in the town of Peterboro, afterwards assuming a partnership with the late Hon. Senator John O'Donohoe in the city of Toronto.

In the year 1874 he was offered and accepted the office of Crown Attorney and clerk of the peace for the County of Victoria by the late Sir Oliver Mowat, assuming his duties in this town in the month of June of that year, having served the

### Inside a submarine

The London Times recently described the difficulties that confront the officers and crew of a submarine during actual warfare. The captain of the submarine must lie in wait for his quarry with the nose of his boat pointing in the direction in which he expects the enemy's vessel to pass. Then he has to estimate the speed of the approaching ship and her distance, and to fire his torpedo at the point at which he calculates she will have arrived when the torpedo has finished its run. Probably he will discharge another torpedo a few seconds later to make doubly sure. In the discussion roused by the letter sent to the Times last June by Admiral Sir Percy Scott, Admiral Bacon, himself an expert and experienced handler of submarines, said: "If any of your readers wishes to appreciate some of the difficulties of submarine work, let him sit down under a chart of the Channel suspended from the ceiling, let him punch a hole through it, and above the hole place a piece of looking-glass inclined at 45 degrees. Let him further imagine his chair and glass moving sideways as the effect of tide. Let him occasionally fill the room with steam to represent mist. Let him finally crumple the chart into ridges to represent the waves, and then try to barry up some of the manoeuvres that look so simple when the chart is spread out on the table and looked down upon in the quiet solitude of a well-lit study."

**TO GET AWAY FROM WAR.**  
While immigration into the United States has nearly ceased, November broke all records in New York for applications by aliens to become citizens. The threatened alien labor law enforcement is supposed to be in part responsible, but it must be supposed that the war has given many a lively sense of the advantage of casting in their lot once and for all with the new world.
