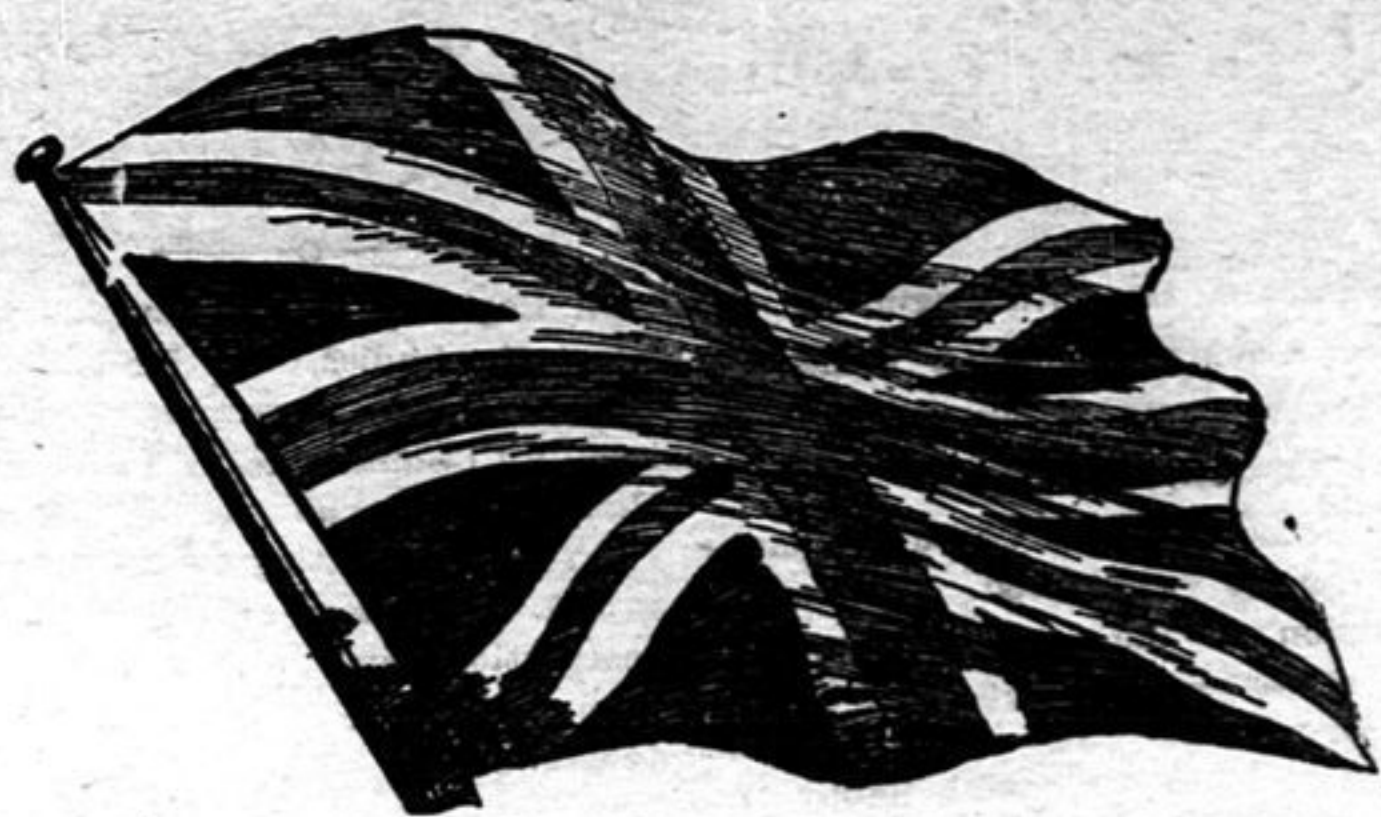

Grand Trunk Determined To Cancel "Flyer"—Business Dull on all Branches

A committee of the Lindsay town council and citizens met at the office of Trainmaster J. D. McMillan of the G.T.R. for the purpose of discussing with Mr. C. E. Horning, D. P.A., the cancelling of the G.T.R. flyer, which leaves Lindsay for Toronto at 8 o'clock a.m. daily, returning at night. The deputation comprised: Mayor R. M. Beal, Ald. Chambers, Dep.-Reeve N. Smale, John Carew, M.P.P., Messrs. B. J. Gough, Jas. Boxall, F. W. Sutcliffe, J. E. Adams, J. D. Flavell and Mr. Bolander.

Mr. J. D. McMillan took the chair and called upon Ald. Chambers who outlined the grievance of the town should the flyer be cancelled.

LINDSAY'S GRIEVANCE. Ald. Chambers said he knew business was somewhat retarded through the present war, but matters would rightify themselves in time, and he possessed optimistic views on results from the Lindsay train if continued on.

The convenience of this morning train to the people of Lindsay was gone into by the speaker and also the number of pupils who attend high schools that are going to be inconvenienced through such a change of train service. The patronage accorded the G.T.R. by Lindsay citizens at all times should be considered by the company and they should be willing to submit to a small loss to benefit the people and show a reciprocity of feeling for past favors.

A SUNDAY SERVICE. Mayor R. M. Beal spoke on the same lines. "Not only should we have this train," said the chief magistrate, "but a Sunday service would be in keeping with the times and accommodation required by a large town like Lindsay." The Mayor felt that the citizens' railway service should be held paramount to dividends for the company and that the train which was a great convenience to the business of the people of Lindsay should be continued and it was their right to have such a service.

COMPANY WILL LOSE. Mr. J. D. Flavell favored the continuation of the "flyer" and considered from a G.T.R. point of view that it was an inopportune time to make such a change as the railway company had under consideration. Mr. Flavell thought the passenger service would grow regardless of the slight falling off in traffic lately. The speaker felt that trade would be diverted to other sources through such a change. He considered the "flyer" had a harvest for some years and a larger one awaited it. The cutting off of the Peterboro end would certainly injure trade for the railway.

THE "FLYER" NECESSARY. Mr. J. E. Adams deplored the loss from a G.T.R. standpoint and in his business the "flyer" was found to be a great convenience, enabling him to go to Toronto and return the same day and transact all his ordinary business. He always thought its service was necessary for the people and also productive of good results for the G.T.R. He would be obliged to patronize the C.P.R. if this early train was cancelled.

SUTTON HEAVIEST END. Trainmaster McMillan stated that seventy per cent. of the business now done by this early morning train could be taken care of by the Sutton division and said the company were losing heavily by running the "flyer."

"FLYER" DOESN'T PAY. Mr. Horning addressed the meeting and congratulated the Lindsay men on the mild and business-like way in which they presented their claim, showing no arbitrary spirit whatever towards the railway. "You are a fine class of business men," said Mr. Horning, "and I

will speak in a business way to you. The passenger trade has decreased to such an extent that we find it utterly impossible to continue the running of the early morning train. No doubt we may sacrifice some trade by discontinuing the "Flyer," but we must take chances. This is the only train which could be taken off. There has only been an average of 30 passengers a day from Peterboro to Stouffville. An average of three passengers went to Toronto each day from Lindsay, but a greater number went west to other points. The biggest decrease in traffic was during the month of November, though December was also quiet. The earnings of the "Flyer" was unsatisfactory."

THE PRUNING KNIFE. So, therefore, it was requisite that the pruning knife, which had been wielded all along the line and throughout the system of the G.T.R. should have its effect, and he (Mr. Horning) was regrettably compelled to tell the deputation that the G. T. R. "Flyer," which leaves Lindsay in the morning at 8 o'clock, would be cut off next week.

OTHER TRAINS CUT OFF. The same measures have been taken on trains running into Montreal between such places as Ottawa, St. Hyacinth and other points. Through Western Canada a similar change has been made and trains are cancelled between Huntsville and North Bay, Toronto and Peterboro, Palmerston, Southampton, Stratford and Owen Sound; in fact it's a general wiping out of trains all over the division.

Mr. Beal contended that on the western divisions the towns were not limited to a few trains each day like Lindsay and they did not form a parallel case as in many western cities and towns trains left every hour or two.

Mr. McMillan thought it was up to every one to put up with "inconveniences at the present stage of our existence and quoted the sufferings borne by the soldier on the battlefield through the war and that the people of Lindsay could sacrifice a certain amount of pleasure by getting up a few hours earlier and catch the 6.40 train for Toronto, which would give them as many hours in the city during the day before returning in the evening. He said the "flyer" was a pet train of his, and paid well for some years and was sorry that it would have to be discontinued. "We cannot lose on this and other trains," said the trainmaster.

BUSINESS PROPORTIONED. Mr. John Carew considered it was impossible to expect the G.T.R. to continue running the train if it was not a paying asset and considered the loss would not seriously effect the citizens. By leaving on the early train passengers could reach Toronto at 8.40 a.m. If the railway company should think fit to replace the train when times get better would be all that was desired.

Mr. Beal—"We are not working for the G.T.R. It is up to them to give the citizens proper service. Their rights should be considered as they have been good loyal friends to the company and gave it a liberal patronage."

Mr. Horning thought the existing conditions would continue until next summer.

Ald. Chambers—"Reduce your fares and it will stimulate trade." The deputation were powerless to influence the railroad man, so Lindsay morning passenger service, so far as the flyer is concerned, is defunct, and next week will pass into oblivion.

FORMER LINDSAYITE NOW PRESIDENT.

Toronto, Jan. 8.—Hard times have not daunted Herbert Corey, of this city. Three months ago he was night watchman on a downtown clothing warehouse. It was the only work he could find to do. Today he is President and Manager of a nice little manufacturing business. Many years ago Corey was taken from his native town (Lindsay) to the United States, where his father apprenticed him to a small manufacturer of mechanical toys. Family connections finally forced Corey to return to Toronto, leaving a fairly lucrative position behind him in that city. Being crippled with rheumatism, he was unable to engage in ordinary work. He tried to find a firm of toy-makers here who would employ him at his own trade, but owing to the fact that most Canadian toys have been imported, he found no field for his abilities.

When the war broke out a certain firm, owning a large department store in Toronto, with branches elsewhere, was unable to get in one of its last toy shipments from abroad, including great quantities of mechanical toys. Corey learned of it, showed his credentials as a master toy-builder, and was given orders for a thousand single-cylinder toy engines. The store advanced him money for his workshop, taking his real estate as security. Corey then gathered a number of young men who were out of employment and taught them the practical side of toy-making. His factory is in a woodshed covered with tar-paper, yet he has given employment to twelve persons for three months. Other stores have turned orders Corey's way and a small company, of which he is the principal stockholder, has now been formed to erect a slightly more roomy shop for next year's trade.

"Because Canadians were importing their toys three months ago, I had to take any sort of work I could get," said Corey, in an interview, to-day. "Now I feel better. Canadians are buying a Canadian product and supporting what will some day be a decent-sized Canadian industry."

Farmers Attention

UNLAWFUL TO SELL MEAT OFF SLEIGH IN THE FORENOON. A farmer from the surrounding neighborhood, who was selling meat off a sleigh on Kent-st. this morning, was interviewed by Chief of Police John Short. According to the market by-law the farmer has a perfect right to sell meat by the quarter from his sleigh, but not until the afternoon, and when made aware of the terms in the by-law, Mr. Farmer promptly withdrew until the dinner hour was past.

ANOTHER FIRE AT FALLS.

Another disastrous fire took place at the Village of Fenelon Falls last Friday, when the residence owned by Mr. Alex. McGee and occupied by Mr. J. Daniels was destroyed, along with a considerable quantity of the furniture.

This makes the third fire in a comparatively short period.
