KING'S GENEROUS GIFT. King Victor Emanuel, of Italy, has donated \$60,000 for the relief of the children abandoned or made orphans in consequence of the earthquake.

HOSPITAL QUARANTINED. Owing to the fact that a woman in the Bradford General Hospital has smallpox, Dr. F. G. E. Pearson, Medical Officer of Health of that city, has placed the hospital in quarantine for fourteen days.

"FLYER" OFF. The Grand Trunk "flyer" did not go through on Monday and will be discontinued in all probability until spring. Morning connection to Toronto on the above line can be made by leaving either at 5.45 or 9.15 o'clock.

NURSES ALLOWED \$150. The Canadian Militia Council has authorized an outside allowance of \$150 to all nurses in the Canadian expeditionary forces. This is the same amount as is allowed to officers for the purchase of service uniforms, etc.

IDEAL WINTER IN WEST. Mr. John A. McFadyen, of Islay, Alberta, in renewing his subscription to The Watchman-Wardek writes that the people of Islay are having a most beautiful winter in that northern zone. The climatic conditions are such that snow of sufficient depth to make good sleighing has fallen and that wood-cutters are working without any covering on their heads, the weather being so warm. POSTAGE FREE (?) Mr. Lyman Minthorne expresses the opinion that all mail matter in connection with the forward movement of the Patriotic Fund should go postage free. It is in the interest of the public, he states, and on those grounds he bases his opinion. The suggestion has been submitted to some of Lindsay's citizens by Mr. Minthorne, and while they agree that the idea is all right they consider it lacks feasibility.

SALE OF PURE-BRED STOCK. Attention is called to the ad. in this week's issue re the annual sale of registered stock under the auspices of the Victoria Pure-Bred Stock Association. The consignment will consist of thirty males and eleven females. Several of these are prize-winners, and the average of the lot, as regards finish and quality, is much above the ordinary. The buying public are assured that a square deal will be accorded to all. Regarding the outlook for live-stock the general trend of opinion of the agricultural press is very optimistic. Predictions are that prices for the next few years will rule higher than for a number of years past. This course will be ruled by supply and demand. G.A.Mour, the Chicago packer, says that there are 12,500,000 less cattle in the United States than in 1907. Conditions on this side of the line are relatively the same, and this is one explanation for present high prices. Considering these conditions no one should hesitate at securing the best breeding stock that money will buy. The sale mentioned above will afford an opportunity to buy some extra good stuff, both males and females.

CHICAGO, Jan. 19.—Flattening out of export demand today pulled the ground from under the bulls in wheat. After being heavy from the start, and at one time 3 1/2c down for May, the market closed unsettled, 1/2c to 3/4c under last night. Other leading staples, too, all showed net losses—corn 1 1/2c, oats 1c to 1 1/2c, and provisions 10c to 12 1/2c.

The influence causing the break were weaker Liverpool cables, heavier arrivals there, and Argentine wheat now in competition.

MONTREAL GRAIN MARKET. MONTREAL, Jan. 18.—There was no improvement in the overseas demand for Manitoba spring wheat today and business in consequence was very quiet. Cables stated that there was considerable reselling at less money than stocks were bought for. The market for current grain is quiet, with a steady trade passing in car lots. Spring wheat flour was in demand and a few sales were made.

Council Proceedings MUNICIPALITY OF LAXTON, DUGBY AND LONGFORD.

Council met in the Township Hall, Head Lake, on Monday, Jan. 11th, at 11 o'clock a.m., as provided by the statutes, with all candidates as elected present. Having taken their property qualifications and declarations of office, they resumed their seats.

McKee-Kerr.—That bill of A. Taylor for Division Court rent be laid over for further consideration until February meeting, and that the Clerk be instructed to write to the Belexy Treasurer regarding raise in scale of Division Court rental.—Carried.

Perkins-Sullivan.—That the following accounts be passed for payment, viz.: E. F.
