#### MARIPOSA COUNCIL

The members of the new Mariposa council assembled on Monday, Jan. 11th, as provided by the statutes, and upon taking their respective seats, subscribed to the declaration of qualification and of office as members of the council for 1915. The new Reeve congratulated Messrs. Neil Ferguson, William Rich and Charles Jenkins on their return to office, and also welcomed the new member, Mr. George H. Mark, of Little Britain, as the new member of the council. The Reeve pointed out the necessity of economy during the present year, and from the discussion that followed it would seem that some amendments would be made to the by-law appointing the commissioners for the present year, as the council have felt for some time that the control of the expenditures has been too much vested in the commissioners.

After the opening preliminaries had been dispensed with the minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. Messrs. Neil McLean and Peter Anderson were seeking information as to who should replace the title in the branch drain from lot 14, con. 14. Mr. George Lane, one of the trustees of S.S. No. 7, Mariposa, had been notified that there were some children of school age who were not attending school, as provided by the School Act, and he desired the council to appoint a trustee officer for that purpose. Mr. C. H. Knight reports that the statute labor from his beat and the one next west had been somewhat mixed during the work in 1914, on account of the stone crusher being in the vicinity, whereby some 25 rods of crushed stone was placed on his beat and some 40 rods on the beat west, and that the 25 rods is represented by 49 days statute labor and the 40 rods by 42 days statute labor, and Mr. Knight appeals to the council for an adjustment of the claim. The Standard Bank reports a balance of \$352.93 to the credit of the township at the end of the year. Applications were received from Messrs. W. J. Gibson, John Stacey and Peter McIntyre for the assessing of 1915. The Treasurer pointed out that it would be necessary to take steps to borrow some money for some odd accounts that would require payment in the near future. The Clerk appealed to the council for a suitable typewriter, as the work of the Clerk required a good deal of manifolding work in connection with by-laws and notices. All up-to-date offices required a typewriter, and the council felt that the present Clerk could handle one to good advantage.

Rich-Mark.—That Mr. John Stacey be appointed assessor for the year 1915 at a salary of \$165.—Carried.  
Rich-Jenkins.—That Messrs. G. M. Douglas and J. J. Sloan be appointed auditors of the township accounts for the balance of the year 1914, at a salary of \$18 each.—Carried.  
Mark-Rich.—That Mr. D. A. Anderson be appointed a member of the Board of Health for the year 1915.—Carried.  
Ferguson-Mark.—That Mr. W. J. McCullough be appointed Sanitary Inspector for the year 1915, at a salary of \$2.50 per day of actual service.—Carried.  
Jenkins-Ferguson.—That Mrs. Susan Hughton be appointed caretaker of the Township Hall and property at a salary of \$50 per year.—Carried.  
Jenkins-Ferguson.—That by-law No. 741, being a by-law to authorize the Reeve and Treasurer to borrow the sum of \$8,000 to meet the current expenditures of the Township of Mariposa for the year 1915, be received and read a first time.—Carried.  
By-law No. 741 was read the usual number of times, passed, signed and sealed.

Rich-Jenkins.—That by-law No. 742, being a by-law to confirm the appointment of certain officers in the Township of Mariposa, be read a first time.—Carried.  
By-law No. 742 was read the usual number of times, passed, signed and sealed.  
Accounts amounting to the sum of \$45 were authorized to be paid, after which the council adjourned till the second Saturday in February.
