## German Authoritative War Book's Amazing Revelations

London, Jan. 21.—Professor J. H. Morgan has translated into the English language "The German War Book," a manual of usages in war on land issued by the General Staff of the German army. This is the most authoritative work of its kind in Germany. There is a reference in the introduction to "humanitarian considerations which not infrequently degenerate into sentimentality and flabby emotion."

The revealing passage is the following: "A war conducted with energy cannot be directed merely against the combatants of the enemy, their State and the positions they occupy, but it will and must in like manner seek to destroy the total intellectual and material resources of the latter."

### ASSASSINATION AND INCENDIARISM.

The Daily Chronicle which publishes a review of Prof. Morgan's translation, says that, after what happened in Belgium, there is cruel irony in the direction that churches, schools, libraries and museums should be spared, and that open towns ought not to be bombarded. According to this German war book, assassination and incendiarism are, in given circumstances, justifiable, as will be seen by the following quotation:

On motion of Messrs. G. H. M. Baker and Smale, the question was referred to the police committee with power to act.

Mr. Arnold said he paid for his sleigh standing on the market and also paid for weighing his meat.

Ald. McLean said that it would be better for the people, who wanted a morning delivery.

## Methodist Church Needs Trained Leaders To-Day

One of the big men in Canadian Methodism occupied the pulpit of the Cambridge-st. Methodist Church Sunday at both services, namely, Rev. W. J. Graham, Secretary of the Educational Department. Dr. Graham, who is a favorite in Lindsay, was greeted with two large congregations, and his sermons were both eloquent and instructive. They were exceedingly interesting, so much so that at the conclusion of each discourse one had the impulse to applaud, but refrained owing to the stately surroundings.

At the morning service he took his text from Isaiah 55th chapter and 4th verse, "Behold, I have given him for a witness to the people, a leader and commander to the people."

In his introductory remarks Dr. Graham referred to the many and varied problems of life, in the country and in the city, and how the trend was towards the urban. He mentioned briefly the slum problem and the social problems. The immigration problem, the speaker stating, that after the war there would be a large immigration to the United States and to Canada. A few leading thoughts brought out during the course of the sermon are as follows:

"Christ invites His followers not to a picnic, but to a campaign—soldiers of Christ."

"There are saints in all churches, and good-for-nothings in all churches. I don't believe in divine order in any church policy, but believe in the visible church, which works its way for Christ to build up the kingdom of righteousness in social life."

"I don't believe that the basic problems in life are economic, as some socialists say. They are not, they are spiritual."

"A man ought to get a full day's pay for a full day's work, but get the man right spiritually and the wage bill will soon be settled."

"The church must have competent leaders if the church is to handle the great problems of the day."

"The gospel is the gospel of the man of Nazareth, the gospel of the carpenter, as well as the Son of God, so why shouldn't this phase of socialism be introduced into the church?"

"The problem will not be solved by the street corner speaker, or by any corporation lawyer, but only by men of sanity, men of poise, men of breadth of vision, men who lift up Jesus Christ, who said 'Come Unto Me all ye that are heavy laden and I will give you rest.'"

## Methodist Church Needs Trained Leaders To-Day

"So good men are needed. Great monuments are the biography of great men."

"I think of Moses; what a mighty leader he was! Some people think a man cannot be a man of culture and lead a Christian life. Paul was an impulsive, warm-hearted type and the Irishman of the discipline. He was a leader but not like Moses. Paul was broader and that is why he was chosen as the man to lead the Gentiles."

"John Knox, John Calvin and John Wesley were all strong men and all trained men. Luther was a trained man and I wish Germany had more men like him now, and we would not be plunged in this awful war."

"William Booth, the founder and head of the Salvation Army, was a great and good man, and a leader. John R. Mott, the head of the Students' Volunteer Movement, is a great leader. Find your man and you will find a great movement."

"Men properly disciplined and properly lead make good soldiers, and so we need men with the same training in the ministry."

"You will accomplish nothing unless you have competent leaders in the missionary work. If you get a good minister who can teach and lead then your church will prosper also."

"The greatest problem Methodism has to face is to raise up a strong body of men, men trained to lead."

"It is necessary to add to your medical knowledge, and we must have medical missionaries men who know. We need missionaries who can translate the best literature for what a nation reads it tends to become, so we must have the best Christian scholars to take the best western literature to China, this awakening nation."

"If our teachers are to teach in China and other lands then we must have leaders, and Methodism must do her share and duty in producing these leaders. The Methodist people must stand behind and support our colleges."

Dr. Graham closed with a stirring appeal in behalf of the educational work of the church, that the college students be supported and the young preachers receive an efficient training.

At the evening service he spoke from the text, "In My Father's House are Many Mansions," St. John 14th chapter and 2nd verse.
