CHICAGO, Jan. 28.—First signs of export buying of wheat had outrun the supply already produced, and was grabbing at next summer's crop.

TORONTO GRAIN MARKET. Wheat, fall, bushel... \$1.15 to \$1.20. Green wheat, bushel... 0.90 to 1.00.

TORONTO BULKY MARKET. Butter, creamery, lb. sc... 0.32 to 0.34. Butter, creamery, solids... 0.30 to 0.31.

TORONTO, Jan. 28.—Quotations on the Board of Trade are as follows: Manitoba wheat—No. 1 northern, \$1.53 1/2, lake ports; No. 2, \$1.51 1/2; No. 3, \$1.49 1/2.

WINNIPEG, Jan. 28.—The Canadian Government is said to be buying seed oats in the west, which will mean only low grades to come this way, and all stocks in eastern ports are said to be practically taken up.

MONTREAL GRAIN MARKET. MONTREAL, Jan. 28.—There was very little demand from foreign buyers for Manitoba spring wheat today, and the few bids that did come forward were so far out of line with prices on the side that no business was done.

DULUTH GRAIN MARKET. DULUTH, Jan. 28.—Wheat—No. 1 hard, \$1.42 1/2; No. 1 northern, \$1.41 1/2; No. 2 do., \$1.39 1/2; May, \$1.42 1/2.

CATTLE MARKETS. UNION STOCK YARDS. TORONTO, Jan. 28.—Receipts of live stock at the Union Yards were 919 cattle, 2034 hogs, 273 sheep and lambs and 71 calves.

STOCKERS AND FEEDERS. There is a fairly good demand for feeding steers, about half weighing from 500 to 1000 lbs., at \$6.75 to \$7.50; steers, 800 to 950 lbs., at \$6 to \$6.50; stockers at \$5 to \$6.

MILKERS AND SPRINGERS. The supply of milkers and springers was not greater than the demand. Prices were firm for those of good to choice quality. The range in values was from \$50 to \$100. The bulk of sales was made from \$65 to \$85 each.

SHEEP AND LAMBS. Sheep, light ewes, \$5.25 to \$6; heavy ewes, \$4 to \$4.50; culls, \$2.50 to \$3.50; lambs, a very few, weighing \$0 to \$0 lbs.

HOGS. Selects, weighed off cars, sold at \$7.90 to \$8; select, fed and watered, \$7.60 to \$7.75; and \$7.20 to \$7.30 f.o.b. cars at country points.
