MARIPOSA APPOINTS A CLERK AND TREASURER

How Business is Done and Undone in the Banner Township

The municipal council of Mariposa met at the town hall, Oakwood, on 11th Feb. 1901. The members were all present. The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed.
The Letters
Several communications were read by the clerk, as follows: From the Brock council re the maintenance of boundary line. From the Eldon council re a grant of money for improvement on boundary line of Eldon. From Mrs. Harris, re opening Flora-st. in the village of Oakwood. From the maintenance of Wm. McCullough. From Thos. Stewart, barrister, Lindsay, desiring some explanation for being dismissed as solicitor. From D. R. Anderson, barrister, Lindsay, stating that his references in his application for the solicitorship were not directed against Mr. Stewart. From the clerk of Blenheim, desiring co-operation in petitioning the legislature not to change the statute in giving the county councils power to assume control of roads.
There were also several applications for the offices of treasurer and clerk.
Cameron-Mark—That Wm. Chanon be appointed to take the best terms possible for the care and maintenance of John Livingstone and that the council be responsible for the same.—Carried.
McKinnon-McCrimmon—That the council grant the sum of \$5 to Wm. Sanguine for the care and support of his grandson.—Carried.
Cameron-McKinnon—That the communication from the township of Brock in the matter of re-adjustment of the labor on the town line favorably and that steps be taken to accomplish this end.—Carried.
McKinnon-McCrimmon—That this council grant the sum of \$50 to be spent on boundary line of Eldon between Grass Hill and the 10th con. of Eldon to meet a like amount granted from the Eldon council.—Carried.
McCrimmon-Cameron—That no action be taken in the matter of opening Flora-st. in the Village of Oakwood.—Carried.
McCrimmon-McKinnon—That the clerk be authorized to write to Mrs. E. E. Sharpe, secretary Home for the Aged, Lindsay, that this council consider that Mr. Wm. McCullough has no claim as an indigent on this township.—Carried.
McKinnon-McCrimmon—That the clerk be authorized to write Mr. T. Stewart, barrister, Lindsay, stating that this council had no fault to find with him or his work but simply decided to appoint Mr. D. R. Anderson solicitor.—Carried.
McCrimmon-Cameron—That council are opposed to the county road system and hereby desire the local legislature to make no change in the statutes tending in that direction.—Carried.
Mark-Cameron—That T. H. Morton be appointed treasurer of the township of Mariposa at a salary of \$100 per annum.—Carried.
McKinnon-McCrimmon—That A. O. Hogg be retained as treasurer of the township of Mariposa for 1901 at a salary of \$120.—Lost.
Mark-Cameron—That the resolution passed at the last meeting appointing J. B. Weldon to the office

of clerk be reconsidered and that J. F. Cummings be appointed clerk of the township of Mariposa at a salary of \$225 per annum and that a by-law be introduced confirming said appointment.—Lost.
McKinnon-McCrimmon—That J. B. Weldon be retained as clerk of the township of Mariposa for 1901 at a salary of \$200.—Carried.
Cameron-McCrimmon—That G. B. Rennie and Geo. Douglas be appointed to audit the accounts of the township of Mariposa from the 1st of Jan. 1901 to the 1st of March and that the auditors hand the books over to the treasurer T. H. Morton on that date.—Carried.
McCrimmon-McKinnon—That this council grant the sum of \$5 to Arch. McEachern in care of D. McCann.—Carried.
Cameron-McCrimmon—That the account of S. Washington for the support of E. Reeder and W. Dorsey be paid, the amount being \$14.66.—Carried.
McKinnon-McCrimmon—That the part of by-law No. 513 appointing G. B. Rennie and Geo. Douglas auditors at a salary of \$6 each be reconsidered and that they receive a salary of \$10.—Carried.
Mark-McKinnon—That the auditor's report and statement of the accounts of the township of Mariposa for the year 1900 be accepted and filed and that the abstract statement and report be published and that their salary of \$10 each be paid.—Carried.
McKinnon-McCrimmon—That the motion appointing T. H. Morton treasurer be reconsidered and that Mr. Stephen Washington be appointed treasurer of the township at a salary of \$95 a year.—Carried.
McKinnon-Cameron—That the clerk be appointed to inspect and report on the culvert on the boundary of Ops lot 18, con. 1, built by Ops council.—Carried.
McCrimmon-McKinnon—That the petition of Wm. Glass and over 100 others asking the council to repeal the by-law doing away with the dog tax be not acted on for the present and that this council may consider the advisability of submitting the question of the dog tax to the ratepayers at the coming municipal elections.—Carried.

Mark-Cameron—That this council do not deem it necessary to enforce vaccination as recommended by the Board of Health.—Carried.
McKinnon-McCrimmon—That the following monthly grants be given to the poor of the township for the year 1901: Ira Owens, care of Mrs. Everson, \$10; Mrs. Fuller, care of Mrs. Ridd, 15 cents per day; Mrs. Woolcott, care of Alex. Smith, \$3.00; Ann Brown care of G. Coone, \$3.00; John Cliffe, care of John Campbell, \$5; Susan Hughton, \$3; John Jeffrey, \$4; Archie McEachern care of D. McGinnis for Feb., Mar. and April, \$5.—Carried.
Mark-Cameron—That J. F. Cummings be and is hereby appointed clerk of the township at a salary of \$175 per annum.—Lost.
Mr. Mark also produced another application from Mr. Cummings at \$100 per year, it was moved by A. McKinnon, seconded by W. H. McCrimmon, that J. B. Weldon be retained as township clerk for 1901 at a salary of \$50.—Carried.
McCrimmon-McKinnon—That by-law No. 514 being a by-law to confirm the appointment of J. B. Weldon as clerk at a salary of \$50 and Mr. S. Washington treasurer at \$95 be received and read a first time.—Carried.
On motion the by-law was read a second and third time and passed.
Cameron-Mark—That G. B. Rennie and Geo. Douglas be appointed to audit the treasurer's books up to the 9th March at a salary of \$3 each, and hand the books over to the treasurer.—Carried.
Mark-Cameron—That the following accounts be paid: R. Smith coffin and attendance Jos. Curtis \$11, McCann & Co. acc. \$4 cents, C. S. Lockwell & Co. \$5.39, Geo. Martinale work on grader done in 1900 \$10.12, Thos. Broad services as fence viewer on line between J. McDougall & T. Broughn \$2, John Pogue work on grader 1900 \$2.50, Mervin Grills breaking stone in 1900 \$2.50, Geo. Hucks travelling in 1900 \$10, John Timney cutting brush con. 9 \$2, Wm. Suggitt grant of \$10 to Mr. Moffatt who was on service in South Africa, Moses McIndoo cedar for bridge con. 14 \$4.50.—Carried.

"SERANUS" OFFENSIVE TO THE CATHOLIC CHURCH

Mgr. Laurent Defines the Attitude of Catholics to Part of the Last Lecture

Our readers have likely been aware that when Mrs. Frances Harrison (Seranus), delivered the last lecture in the institute course she quoted a poem of her own descriptive of St. Anne de Beaupre, that contains expressions to which Magistrate Steers objected in a letter in the public press. Mr. Steers also protested to the Board of Education. At the meeting of that body last week (reported elsewhere) Mr. Kylie the separate school representative on the Board said he saw nothing very objectionable in the poem. The protest was filed.
Mgr. Laurent Speaks
On Sunday last at High Mass Mgr. Laurent referred to the incident to the following effect:
I would not have noticed the matter had it not been for the action of the Separate School representative on the Board of Education, who when the question of an apology came up declared that he saw nothing for offence in the poem. The result was that Mr. Steer's letter was filed. On that account in justice to this congregation, and to myself, I must protest against this course.
"Seranus" refers to the Cross of Jesus Christ in these words:
"There since the world began,
The crucifix stands o'ergrown
With moss
One is always near some talisman."
We know the word talisman signified among the ancients a superstitious charm or something that brought good luck to those who possessed it. Therefore she regards the Cross as a superstition.
Another reference is as follows:
"Some scull that the poor devout
May scan,
Some bone that glows with a
wonderful gloss."
Here a sneering allusion is made to the relic of St. Anne. At another place the people are described as a caravan. A caravan was known in the eastern countries as a moving circus or band of Bohemians who gathered with their horses and tents as a means of travelling from place to place.
Again:
"Britanny hearken and wonder!
Your children's children incline
Passing the Host as it moveth
along the street"
Here reference is made to the procession of the Blessed Sacrament. The purport of this parody is evident, and in the name of his congregation I protest, first against making a superstition of the Cross, and secondly against the insult offered to St. Anne, the grandmother of our Lord and the patroness of the province paid to the Blessed Sacrament.

The Victoria Creamery

The stockholders of the Victoria Creamery held their annual meeting on Saturday afternoon.
Secretary O'Boyle's statement for 10 months showed:
Milk received.....\$9021 lbs
Cream received..... 31303 lbs
Average test of milk.....3.55 p.c.
Average test of cream.....21.9 p.c.
Average ratio of butter fat to butter.....1 to 1.19
Gross value of butter.....\$8269.24
Butter made and sold.....41238 lbs
Gross value of cream.....\$640.30
Gross value of buttermilk.....\$193.43
Average price of milk per cwt.....71.65 cts.
Mr. H. J. Lytle said that \$400 had been paid on the debt and hoped that milk drawing routes would be so arranged this year, as to reduce the cost of drawing to 10 cents per 100 pounds.
Capt. Hunter was thanked for his services as salesman, and in reply said that Mr. Jno. Connolly of Ops was the first to propose a creamery for Lindsay. Mr. Connolly was elected honorary president. The other officers are: pres. D. Cayley, vice D. Scully, sec.-treas. W. F. O'Boyle, auditor H. J. Lytle directors N. Smale, Jno. Twohey, Robt. Bryans, Jas. Roche, J. O'Loughlin and W. Flavell.
Mr. Geo. Lytle spoke of the market for butter and the advantages of hand separators since cream could be got cheaply to the factory. Butter would gain on cheese next year.
Mr. Wilkinson of Cambrey, a new member and graduate of the O. C. A. at Guelph spoke of the methods of testing milk.
The patron's meeting was called for March 2. Then routes will be named and allotted and the buttermilk sold.

Academy of Music

The Marks Brothers are to be here next week. They are popular favorites.
—Miss Olof Krarer, the native Eskimo lady who has lived for some years in America and is said to be the only female of her nationality on the continent, lectured under Y.M.C.A. auspices on Tuesday night. The house was well filled. The speaker and her address had merit chiefly of a curious sort. Miss Krarer is 40 inches in height and weighs 92 lbs. When she left Greenland she was 30 lbs. heavier. She speaks English fairly well and has a remarkable appreciation of American humor. Her appearance in Eskimo dress was a decided novelty.

Teachers' Convention

The teachers of East Victoria met in convention at the Central School on Thursday and Friday of last week. A number of valuable papers were read by teachers. The discussion on homework brought out different opinions. Rev. L. S. Hughson B.A. and Mr. L. V. O'Connor B.A. took part in it. Some held that novel-reading injured the children and homework got the blame, others that it should not be given. All agreed that the very young children should have no homework.
At night Principal Scott of the Toronto Normal School lectured on "The Training of Children." From their psychological and physiological ground work, Mr. Scott outlined the process by which people attain their skill in physical, mental and moral activities. During the convention Mr. Scott lectured on School Management and Indirect Teaching.

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
