Meanwhile Mr. Armstrong with a wooden fork handle held the burning wire away from the hay and straw just beneath it. It was only by cutting the wires that the danger was averted.

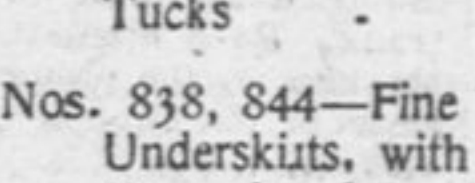

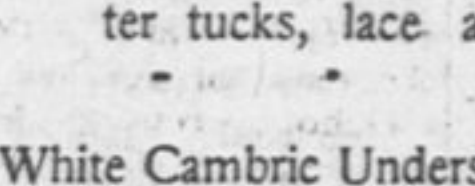

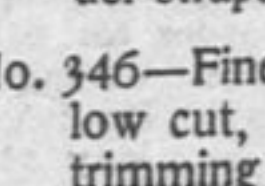
