COUNTY COUNCIL IN SESSION CLOSING PROCEEDINGS

Electric Power Debentures of Bobcaygeon will not be Guaranteed—Poultry Show Granted \$100—Other Grants—House of Refuge Report

Council met Saturday at 10.45 a. m., members all present except Mr. Bailey, and the Warden in the chair. The Warden submitted a statement from the Council of the Township of Mariposa, of the amount expended in the smallpox outbreak.

On motion of Messrs. Johnson and Graham, the document was referred to the committee on Finance and Assessment.

On motion of Mr. Austin, seconded by Mr. Fairbairn, Geo. Ryng, Reeve and H. Mark, Councillor, of the village of Bobcaygeon, accompanied by R. J. McLaughlin, K. C., addressed the Council, and asked that the debentures of the village of Bobcaygeon to the amount of \$25,000 be guaranteed, and seconded by Messrs. Fairbairn and Austin, that the committee on Finance and Assessment consider the advisability of guaranteeing the debentures.—Carried.

After adjourning for ten minutes the report of the Finance and Assessment was read, Council going into committee thereon, with Mr. Austin in the chair. The report was adopted.

On motion of Councillors Graham and Ellis, the report of the Board of Management of the House of Refuge was again received, read and finally adopted.

It was moved and seconded that the per diem allowance for the session be paid to Mr. Bailey, as there is reason to believe his absence is caused by illness.—Carried.

On motion By-law No. —, to further amend By-law No. 573, entitled "A by-law to confirm and provide for the salaries of the officials of the gaol and of the County of Victoria," was read, and on the third reading was passed by a two-thirds vote, signed and sealed.

On motion a petition to the Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Ontario praying that the question of establishing a provincial telephone service receive the early attention of the Government, was read and passed on the third reading.

On motion of Messrs. Fairbairn and Austin, a petition to the Legislative Assembly in accord with the prayer of the foregoing petition was read a third time and passed.

Council then went into committee of the whole on By-law No. —, extending the term for the taking of the assessment in the Town of Lindsay and the Townships of Emily and Ops, Mr. Staback in the chair. The by-law was passed.

The session then closed.

The following reports were read by the chairman of the various committees at last week's meeting of the County Council:

Your committee beg to recommend that the chairman be authorized to ask for tenders and award contracts for fuel and other supplies.

Your committee recommend that the chairman be requested to have the condition of the flagstaff examined, and to have such repairs made as he may deem to be necessary.

Your committee beg to recommend that the chairman be authorized to exercise supervision of the Court House, Gaol and Registry office and the premises during the year, and to make such improvements and repairs as he may find to be required for the purpose of keeping the property in a satisfactory condition.

HOUSE OF REFUGE.

Gentlemen.—The Board of Management beg to make their report. The House was opened on Oct. 25, 1905, and the first inmate was received on October 30th.

One of the first duties that devolved upon the Guard was the removal to the House of the twenty inmates of the Home for the Aged. The transfer was begun on November 3rd and was continued gradually until November 9th.

It is practicable to give the statistics for the period from the reception of the first inmate until December 31st, and the particulars will follow but as the expenditures cannot be

the Inspector of Public Charities and a communication from the Clerk of the Township of Mariposa. There were present during the consideration of the documents T. H. Watson, esq., Reeve of the Township of Mariposa, and George Graham, esq., a member of the Council, that Township, who urged in forcible terms that instead of maintaining the House of Refuge by a general levy on the whole County each municipality from which inmates are received should pay a certain amount for the support of such inmates. Your committee cannot recommend that the proposal be accepted. Your committee recommend that the report of the Board of Management be re-introduced in the Council.

Your committee have considered the resolutions of Council directing them to report thereon, and beg to recommend as follows:

1. That the sum of fifty dollars be granted to each of the public libraries in the County.
2. That the sum of twenty-five dollars each be granted to the East Victoria and West Victoria Farmers' Institutes.
3. That the sum of ten dollars each be granted to the East Victoria and West Victoria Women's Institutes.
4. That the sum of one hundred dollars be granted to the Lindsay Poultry and Pet Stock Association.
5. That no grant be made to the North Victoria Rifle Association.
6. That no grant be made to the Victoria Rifle Association of the House of Refuge at the June session in each year for the purpose of examining the farm and buildings.
7. That it is inexpedient to petition for the repeal of the provision of the Assessment Act which requires that the list of lands to be offered for sale for taxes shall be published in the Ontario Gazette.

Your committee have considered the documents referred to them, and beg to recommend as follows:

1. That leave be given for the introduction of a by-law under the provisions of the Assessment Act, section 56, for taking the assessment in the Townships of Emily, Mariposa and Ops, between the first day of February and the fifteenth day of June, and in the town of Lindsay between the first day of February and the fifteenth day of May.
2. That the Clerk be instructed to support, on behalf of the council, the application of Lieut.-Col. James Deacon to the Government of the Province of Ontario to be placed on the list of retired civil servants who may be entitled to a gratuity or other pension on the basis of their services.
3. That the communications from the Mayor and Clerk of the Town of Lindsay, respecting the House of Refuge, be referred to the Board of Management.
4. That no grant be made to the Lindsay Law Association.
5. That the sum of two hundred and forty-two dollars and eleven cents be granted to the Township of Mariposa, in consideration of the expense in which the municipality has been involved by reason of an outbreak of smallpox. The statement submitted shows that the cost was \$605.28.
6. That the sum of fifty dollars be granted to the National Sanitorium Association for the support of the Free Hospital for Consumption, that Col. Sam. Hughes, M.P., Hon. John Dobson and Hon. Geo. McHugh be requested to represent Council at the annual meeting of the Canadian Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis, to be held in Ottawa.
7. That the application from R. Rogers, esq., President of the Cambridge Public Library, be filed, the grant having been made under resolution of Council.
8. That an increase of fifty dollars per annum be made in the salary of Mr. Mortimer Andrus, turnkey at the gaol, and that leave be given to introduce a by-law to give effect thereto.
9. That the application of Miss Margaret McHugh, housekeeper at the Court House, for an increase of salary, be not acceded to.
10. That no grant be made to the Prisoners' Aid Association.
11. That the application of the Victoria Rifle Association for a grant to be filed, the question having been disposed of under a resolution of Council.
12. That the sum of six hundred dollars be granted to the Ross Memorial Hospital.
13. That the sum of ten dollars be granted to the Ontario Municipal Association, and that the documents, consideration of which was deferred from the November session, be filed.
14. That the sum of \$460.00 and the amount of fees for the same period, dealt with in like manner, was \$61.89.
15. That Johnson Ellis, Archibald McFarlane, Adam E. Staback, Jas. Graham and Charles Fairbairn, esq., and the Warden, be appointed a delegation to the proposed meeting of representatives from the county councils, for the purpose of considering the proposed changes in the County Councils Act, and submitting their views to the government.
16. That no action be taken upon the request of Mr. E. F. Mason, esq., for the appointment of delegates to wait upon the Dominion Government respecting the Trent Valley waterway.
17. That the purpose of the draft of a petition to the Legislative Assembly, respecting the responsibility of Councils for non-repair of highways, transmitted by the Ontario Municipal Association, be not acceded to.
18. That as the Council at the November session passed a petition to the Government of the Province respecting the proposed change in the constitution of County Councils, in terms similar to those contained in the draft petition transmitted by the Council of the County of Ontario, it is unnecessary to prepare another petition.
19. That a petition be introduced to the Council in the terms of the draft petition transmitted by the Council of the County of Waterloo in favor of a Provincial telephone system.
20. That the draft petition to the Legislative Assembly respecting the appointment of High School trustees transmitted to the Council of the County of Lambton, and the consideration of which was deferred from the November session, be filed.
21. That that communication from the manager of the Light, Heat & Power Co., respecting the motor power in the House of Refuge be referred to the Board of Management.
22. That a pedlar's license be issued to Mr. Arch. McGillivray, free of charge.
23. That Johnson Ellis, Esq., be appointed a member of the Lindsay Collegiate Lecture Course Committee.
24. That communications as follows be filed: From the secretary of the Department of Railways and Canals, acknowledging the receipt of petition relative to the Gull River navigation; from Hon. Nelson Monteith acknowledging receipt of communication respecting the constitution of County Councils; from Thomas Stewart, esq., relative to Forestry continuation; and from the clerks of counties of Northumberland and Durham, Halton and Lanark, respecting a certain phase of the consideration of the County Councils Act.
25. That the Registrar's statutory return of fees, etc., for the year '05 be filed. The amount of surplus payable to the county is \$33.30.
26. That reports as follows be filed: Public Libraries of Bobcaygeon, and Kinnmount; Lindsay Law Association; South Victoria Agricultural Society; Children's Aid Society, and financial statement of the township of Halton, 1905.
27. Your committee recommend that the report of the Bank of Montreal of balance at the credit of the Treasurer on Dec. 31, 1905, and the statement of the Treasurer of the County of Peterboro of payments made to the Treasurer of this County in 1905, be placed in the hands of the auditors.
28. Your committee have examined the statement of expenses in the case of Duncan McDonald Brown, a man committed to the gaol as a vagrant and found to be suffering from smallpox, and the accompanying accounts, and a report from Dr. W. C. Jeffers, gaol surgeon. Your committee recommend that the accounts paid on the order of the gaol surgeon, of \$290.75, be passed; that the sum of twenty-four dollars claimed by the Town of Lindsay for the use of tent, house, utensils, etc., be paid; and that the sum of fifty dollars be paid to the gaol surgeon in consideration of his services in the treatment and control of the case.
29. Your committee recommend that the sum of ten dollars be paid to Mrs. George W. Stokes, the balance of the amount of her claim of \$40, for care and maintenance of Mrs. Jane Ward, now an inmate of the House of Refuge, over the amount guaranteed by relatives of the indigent woman.
30. Your committee recommend that accounts as follows be passed, namely: John McSweeney, County Police Magistrate, expenses to Oct. 1st, 1905.....\$41.05

Victoria Industrial School, maintenance..... 19.11
St. John's Industrial School, maintenance..... 37.86

31. Your committee recommend that the claim of Mr. John McDonald for \$6.75 for cleaning, etc., of rooms lately occupied by the County Attorney and County Police Magistrate, be not entertained.
32. The Clerk and Treasurer has reported that in arranging the insurance as directed at the November session he found it necessary to change the relative amounts on the buildings of the Court House and gaol, and the contents of the buildings, while allowing the aggregate to remain. Your committee recommend that the action be approved.
33. Your committee beg leave to introduce a by-law to authorize the Warden and Treasurer to borrow money.
