## LINDSAY WINTER POULTRY SHOW WAS A GREAT SUCCESS.

### Splendid Exhibit of Birds and Pet Stock—Some Valuable Poultry—Addresses by Messrs. A. G. Gilbert and W. Flavelle—What Outsiders think of the Show—Full List of Prize Winners.

"The best first poultry show that I have ever seen in the Poultry Association in Canada." These were the words of Mr. A. G. Gilbert of the experimental farm, Ottawa, at the meeting held in the council chamber on Friday last, and there is no doubt that many others who were present at the meeting and also at the show will heartily endorse them. The entries were large, far exceeding the hopes of any of the promoters. Birds were shipped from Guelph, Nanawee, Burnt River, Bowmanville, Peterboro, Toronto, Oakwood, Valentin, Springville and many other points, whilst Lindsay was also well represented.

Mr. James Lawder had an entry of 32 birds, consisting chiefly of game birds, brown red, black red, Japanese, which brought him several more red tickets.

Mr. Stephen Oliver, the well-known bird fancier, entered 70 birds, Brahmans, Houdans, Barred Rocks, Partridge Cochins, Langshans and others. Mr. Oliver was successful, as the prize list will show.

Mr. Bert Letts, another townsman, entered four birds and captured three prizes.

Mr. A. Robinson secured four prizes with an entry of six birds.

Another well-known exhibitor, Mr. Geo. Calvert, secured half a dozen prizes in the class for Rocks, Dorkins and Leghorns.

Of the outsiders, Mr. Lush from Peterboro had a splendid exhibit of over 100 chickens for which he succeeded in carrying off a number of prizes. One, a silver spangle, being a beautiful bird, and also a valuable one, having won prizes in Boston, New York.

There was a remarkably fine showing of Orpingtons, but, Mr. Kerr, of Toronto, carried off four red tickets for his four entries, one of them being a magnificent cock, imported from Scotland, and which had already won 26 prizes.

Mr. Cole, of Bowmanville, was most successful with his exhibit, securing 39 prizes with 40 birds. His geese, ducks and turkeys were one of the features of the show and were admired by all who saw them. In Langshans and Cochins, Mr. Cole was also a winner, securing ten prizes, seven of which were firsts in the latter classes.

—The many friends of Mr. Joseph Harper were not only pleased with his success, but were also pleased with the birds in Canada. He captured first honors for aged males but he stood first and second on females, and stood first on best hen of all breeds. Birds bred by him won all the first-class honors in Rocks. He was offered \$30 for a pair of Rocks. Mr. Harper explains that as he lives in a rocky country he has the pick of the rocks and was responsible for the exhibition in a number of refreshment stalls down town. He has the first pick when it comes to rocks in the great north.

Many friends are congratulating Mr. Frank Carew on his handsome contribution to the show in the way of entries in homer, pouter, tumbler and Jacobin pigeons, Guinea hens, bantams, Guinea pigs, French rabbits and Belgian hares. He won eight first prizes, four seconds and three thirds, a creditable showing for an amateur. He has the right sort to pass muster.

—Mr. W. R. Knight, a prominent exhibitor of poultry from Bowmanville, states with no uncertain sound that the Victoria County Poultry Show was one of the best local shows that it has ever seen. There is nothing that succeeds like success, and his capturing no less than 20 first prizes, seven seconds, two thirds and two specials, makes him sweet on Victoria's first show.

—Mr. James Baptie of Springville was well pleased with the show. He exhibited some thirty birds and captured 15 first prizes and about the same in seconds. He also reported a number of sales. His opinion was that it was a great showing of high-class birds, but the coops were hardly in keeping with the importance of the show. Then they should have extra judges for different classes. While Mr. Trew was a capable judge, it was too much to expect him to do it all.

—Mr. T. J. Cole, of Bowmanville, thought it was the best show he was ever at and thought it could not be beaten in any county for a first attempt. He showed bronze and white Holland turkeys, Pekin and Aylesbury ducks, Toulouse and Emden geese, Buff Wyandottes, Dark Brahmans, Buff and Partridge Cochins, Black Langshans and Pekin bantams. He captured 35 prizes and a special out of 49 entries. Hardly any room to grumble at that. Mr. Cole also made a large number of sales of laying eggs.

—Mr. Bert Letts of Lindsay, is an amateur bird fancier who made a good showing with Plymouth Rocks. With four birds he captured a first, second and third prize, and that in the very best contest ever held in this section.

—Mr. T. F. McCabe, of East Toronto, expressed his pleasure with everything and stated it was the best local show he ever attended. Next year he will attend and make double the number of entries. He showed a number of Buff Wyandottes and captured a number of the best prizes. He was also in charge of Mr. W. J. Kerr's birds, which secured four first prizes in the classes for Buff Orpingtons, a really handsome variety. He took a great deal of pride in exhibiting a handsome imported cock of this strain that was sired by an English bird that was sold for \$80.

Mr. McCabe was also in charge of an even half dozen White Rocks, owned by Mr. Geo. Elliott of the same place, that did well in the hot bunch. His score card in this bunch placed him one and two on hens, second on male bird, first and second on pullets, first on cockerel and two seconds on pit games. On the last day of the show he sold in poultry \$21 and expects more sales, to result from his visit to Lindsay.

—Mr. Forteous Conqueror showed three fine specimens of White Rock and wound the fair by purchasing a fine cockerel from Mr. Baptie.

—Messrs. W. P. and G. King of

Oakwood, made a great exhibit of poultry in all the leading varieties, and were among the heavy weights when it came to cash up. Their entry list included black and pencilled Hamburgs, Golden, Silver and White Crested Polands, White Wyandottes, Barred Rocks, Langshans, Bantams, and geese. They won some fifty prizes and made several sales, one bunch going to Manitoba.

—Mr. James Lawder of the east ward, captured first honors on Minorca cock and pullet. But Jimmy's heart is in the fighting sort and he won some fifteen prizes with his handsome Pit and Japanese game. One of his best birds was exhibited to admirers of this strain easily 100 times. He practically swept this class. He also captured the red tickets for Homers, Tumblers and Pouters in the pigeon classes. His crowning glory was in securing first honors for the biggest eggs—which was
