Glasgow Meeting At Which He Appeared As a "Jolly Beggar" to Plead For the Preservation of the Auld Brig o' Ayr, Made Famous By Burns, Who Had Transformed Scottish Life and Characteri

Within the Banqueting Hall of Glas-low Municipal Buildings recently a seting was held in furtherance of heme for preserving the Auld Brig of Ayr. The chief speaker was the Earl of Rosebery. Lord Rosebery said he had come to

Glasgow on many previous occasions, and in many different characters, but he never before came in the character of what their poet whom they were thinking of that day would have called "A Jolly Beggar."
