— The sale at Fanning's repository, William street, Lindsay, last Saturday, was very successful. Next sale, Saturday, March 2.

— Mr. G. F. Marter has been re-elected President of the Ontario Branch of the Dominion Alliance, and Rev. B. H. Spence, Secretary.

— Messrs. Sadler & Fee, having taken out more logs than they needed, disposed of a large lot to Mr. Kelly, millowner of Bridgenorth, at a good profit.

— Mr. W. T. Arthurs, principal Minden Model School, has withdrawn from joint proprietorship in the Minden Echo. Mr. R. T. Baker continues as sole proprietor.

— Many of the country roads are reported to be badly drifted since the high wind of Sunday and Monday following a considerable snowfall a day or two previous.

— Sir James R. Gowan, at the age of 92, has resigned his seat in the Senate on account of the infirmities of age. He was County Judge of Simcoe, for 42 years, and has been a Senator since 1885.

— The Globe gives currency to the statement that provision will be made this session by the Ontario Government for the introduction of the teaching of agriculture into High schools.

— Mr. Frank Forbert, the well-known shoeman, has rented the store lately occupied by Mr. H. A. Morgan and will fit it up for a shoe store in the best style. It will be opened on Thursday, March 7. The stock will be entirely new.

— The photographs for the cuts of the Ross Memorial Hospital, and the Victoria House of Refuge which appeared in the annual report of the Inspector of Prisons and Public Charities, as mentioned last week, were taken by Mr. Peter Wilson, of the Watchman-Warder.

— It is understood that Mr. W. H. Simpson has sold the business of the Pym House to Mr. George W. Hewitt, of Toronto, the change to take effect effect March 15. Mr. Simpson has kept the house eighteen years in a manner which made it very popular with the travelling public.

— At the request of the Premier, Mr. J. W. Flavelle has withdrawn his resignation from the Board of Governors of the University of Toronto, and will remain a member of that body.

Mr. Flavelle desired to resign on account of the pressure of his business duties and the new hospital and other activities of a like nature.
