THE RECEPTION TO MR. CHARLES FAIRBAIRN FULLER ACCOUNT OF THE PROCEEDINGS AT BOBCAYGEON—THE ADDRESS PRESENTED TO HIM. Last week a brief account was given of the reception to Mr. Charles Fairbairn at Bobcaygeon on Saturday evening, February 16. By an inadvertence Mr. Mason was spoken of as the Reeve of Bobcaygeon, whereas it should have been Mr. Byng, an independent gives a fuller account, which here follows: A reception was held in the Town Hall, Bobcaygeon, Saturday evening, February 16, in honor of Mr. Charles Fairbairn, who, having received a government appointment, was about departing for Toronto. The hall was decorated with flags, and about 8:30 Mr. W. J. Read took the chair, and called upon Mr. E. Tiers, reeve of Verulam, and councillors Wm. Hetherington, and John Mitchell, and Mr. Geo. C. Byng, Reeve of Bobcaygeon, and councillors John Walker and D. Hetherington and several other gentlemen to take the platform. Mr. Fairbairn was seated in the centre of the group, and Mr. Bottom read the following address, after which all sang, "For he's a jolly good fellow."

THE ADDRESS. Dear Mr. Fairbairn, your departure from our midst, and honor under the Legislature of this Province, gives us an opportunity of meeting to-night to express in some measure, our appreciation of what you have done for the municipality in which you have so long lived, and our esteem for you as a friend and broad-minded citizen. It is now more than forty years since you, a young man with your bride, came to live amongst us, and settled on the farm you are now leaving. About forty-three years ago your fellow-citizens elected you to your first public office in the municipality, and you have been identified in the present way with the progress and welfare of the Township of Verulam.

THE SPEAKING. Mr. Fairbairn replied in his usual good manner and regretted to leave his home and township. He thanked them all for the kind message. He referred back to his old days and told how he and his wife settled in the township. Many of his old friends then had passed away. He would not say good-bye, and would always refer to Verulam and Bobcaygeon as his dear old home. Mr. E. Tiers then spoke and congratulated Mr. Fairbairn upon his appointment, and was sorry to see him severing his connection with the township. He wished him all success, and a long and happy enjoyment of his position. Mr. Wm. Hetherington regretted the departure of Mr. Fairbairn, and wished him more ease and much pleasure in his new position. He will be much missed, and he and his family a long and happy life. Mr. Mitchell referred to the time Mr. Fairbairn came to Verulam and the way he worked. His public life was a great credit to him, steadily progressing from councillor to member of the Dominion Parliament. He was not showing age and he might be spared to enjoy his new position for many years. His name is honored throughout the township. Mr. Byng had a cold and was in poor health, but he was glad Mr. Fairbairn had received an appointment, for it was nothing but what he deserved long ago. Mr. D. Hetherington and Mr. Walker spoke in flattering words and congratulated Mr. Fairbairn upon his appointment and hoped he would long enjoy it. Mr. Wm. Thurston said he spoke with joy and regret together, and that he wished Mr. Fairbairn to receive the acknowledgment of his services, and regret at his departure. It was about forty-three years ago he remembered Fairbairn, and said he was the only man then around, so when he leaves Mr. Thurston will be the next oldest resident. He was glad Mr. Fairbairn had received the position, and hoped he may live long and enjoy it. John Kelly said he sat for ten years in Council and always held a high opinion of Mr. Fairbairn. He spent his time here and his health, and he was sorry to see his old friend leave. Mr. Lithgow congratulated Mr. Fairbairn upon receiving the position, and he well deserved it. He had known him since a boy, sat in Council with him and always held a good opinion of Mr. Fairbairn's ability as Reeve of the Township. He had been sorry to see him leave. He had fought many elections, and in an honorable way. He had now have to work with his head and not with his hands, and he hoped the change of position he may enjoy, and always look upon Verulam and Bobcaygeon as his home. Mr. Bottom and Mr. Smith, the Chairman, Mr. Read, each congratulated Mr. Fairbairn and wished him long and prosperous life. They regretted Mr. Fairbairn's departure and wished he would enjoy health and rest. The evening was then closed with God Save the King, and a hearty shake hands with their guest.

Apple Trade Extended in Great Britain We are now getting towards the close of the apple season as regards the Canadian and American fruit, says the London correspondent of the Montreal Star, although there is never any possibility of our markets being without supplies. As soon as these sources of supplies are exhausted we have the Antipodes to depend upon, and the shipments from that part of the Empire carry us through to the season when some of the earliest home varieties are ready. With the shortening of supplies on the market the prices have increased. The United States shippers have been endeavoring to keep the markets supplied with Baldwins, Greenings and Russets. But for these consignments the Nova Scotian and Canadian apples would be making a high figure. Efforts have been made this season to extend the trade by direct imports to some of the leading provincial centres. Larger supplies have been received in Yorkshire this season. It is satisfactory to find that in Leeds alone 10,000 barrels were imported, and these met with a good sale, despite the fact that the markets this year were more largely furnished with home-grown fruit. It is stated that not one single complaint as to unfair grading and packing has reached Mr. J. E. Jackson, the commercial agent for the Leeds and Hull district. There is every indication that this system of catering for the large provincial towns by direct supplies will be greatly extended in the future. It will certainly conduce a large extension of the Canadian fruit trade. Regret is felt amongst some of the provision merchants that there was a falling off in the Canadian bacon supplies last year, and that the same condition is amongst the patriotic section, who prefer supporting our cousins in Canada to aiding American trade. Owing to the shortage of the Canadian supplies there was no other alternative than to support the American rivals. There is an opening for an extension of the bacon trade until the figures reach the same satisfactory proportions as those relating to the Canadian cheese importations. Some interesting suggestions as to Canadian cheese were made recently at a trade meeting at Bristol. A criticism was made that the cheese boxes in some instances were not large enough. After packing, when the cheese expands, an undesirable impression is made on the sides from the woodwork. This prevents the cheese being turned into a perfect form, and naturally detracts from its value. In some cases, owing to the pressure, the boxes break in transit.

Verdict of Coroner's Jury to Owen McDonald's Death An inquest was held at Midland into the death of Brakeman Owen McDonald who lost his life in an accident at Waubushene. The jury returned the following verdict: "That Owen McDonald's death was caused by the absence of a lever on G. T. flat No. 68309, necessitating his stepping between said cars, and that the same was thereby setting his foot caught in front of a frog while obeying an order issued by conductor or Hamford to disconnect said flat car from balance of train, and further in so doing he was acting in accordance with the usual custom of employees under similar circumstances." "We are also of the opinion from evidence submitted as to percentage of care in commission; similarly affected, that the Grand Trunk Railway Company are negligent in not providing for a more thorough inspection of cars."

Deport Insane Settlers Arrangements have been made by Mr. S. Armstrong, Provincial Inspector of Asylums, through the Dominion Immigration Department, for the deportation of five settlers who have, since their arrival in Canada, developed insanity. All are men, and all came from Great Britain originally. One of them, who was confined in Toronto Asylum, has been sent back to the Old Country. Another was removed from Hamilton. Several more persons of the same type will leave Canada next Saturday. A considerable number of similar cases of colonists who have shown signs of mental weakness will be similarly dealt with shortly. During the last month 18 lunatics, who came shortly before into the country, have been deported.

Canadian Grown Seed is Best Before the House of Commons' Committee on Agriculture, Dr. Saunders, of the Experimental Farms, gave evidence recently on the productiveness of Canadian grown seed. He quoted from appreciative letters by Western farmers in order to support his previous statement that it was possible to produce from a single 4 lb. sample of oats, such as distributed from the Central Experimental Farm, a crop of 2,500 bushels at the end of three years. A letter from Mr. W. A. Lyndon, Lyndon, Alberta, a small village in the foothills of the Rockies, situated at an altitude of 4,200 feet above the sea level, read: "In 1904 I sowed the sample of 4 lbs. of Tartan King oats I got from you. This year I threshed 1,600 bushels. They yielded this season at the rate of 116 bushels per acre." Dr. Saunders explained that at the Central Experimental Farm a number of varieties of field roots had been grown from seed offered by Canadian seedsmen, and alongside of these others from the finest strains of seed offered by the larger seedsmen of Europe. After careful tests for five or six years it has been found that the seeds purchased from Canadian seedsmen give crops, which average fully as good as those obtained from the most noted seedsmen in Europe. In future it is intended to conduct trial plots of field roots with varieties of seeds purchased in the Dominion. Dr. Saunders outlined the Government's policy in connection with the establishment of branch farms at Leithbridge and Lacombe, Alberta, and the character of the experiments that would be carried on there. It is also intended to establish a branch experimental farm near Charlottetown, P. E. I.

Profitable Herd of a Glangarry Man Mr. A. M. Campbell, of Glangarry, county, is one of the progressive farmers in Eastern Ontario, who has been keeping a herd of profitable milk cows. The average production of his herd last year, was 7,600 lbs. of milk—a very creditable showing. Mr. Campbell is a practical farmer and in a letter to the Ottawa Valley Journal gives some interesting information regarding the care of feed given the cows as follows: "In reply to your letter asking for information in regard to my herd which produced an average of 7,500 lbs. per cow for the season of 1906, I may say that my herd consists of a few pure-bred Holsteins, a number of Holstein grades, and a few grade Ayrshires. I milked an average for the season of 20 cows. The first calves were dropped about the 1st of March. Cows continued coming in at intervals till about the 20th of July. Those that came in early were fed well on cured clover, hay and straw. For concentrated foods I fed ground oats, gluten meal, and some bran, having due regard to the requirements of the individual cow. That feed was continued till about the 20th of May when the grass supplied their wants of food for the summer. They had a good supply of pure fresh water, were salted regularly, milked regularly, and handled carefully. In the early fall when the nights were cold and wet I stabled them, and when the pastures became short I fed them corn till they were felled in for the winter season. I would say
