Board of Trade Annual— President's Excellent Address

The annual meeting of the Board of Trade was held on Monday, and was not at all attended by the members. In fact the importance of the meeting merited a larger attendance. Reports were submitted and read. Reports were submitted and read. Reports were submitted and read.

Among the important matters that came up for discussion was the proposition of Mr. J. F. Weldon, re the formation of a Mutual Life Insurance Company in the counties of Victoria and Haliburton, a report of which will be found in another column.

Representatives of another company interested in the gas question were heard, and it looks as if Lindsay will have gas of some kind manufactured or natural gas will be produced within the near future for the citizens and manufacturers.

The report of the council was then read. As the report appeared in the daily papers on Monday, it will be unnecessary to repeat the items contained therein, suffice to say that they were very encouraging. It was on motion of Messrs. McLean and Baker accepted.

Secretary Donald then read the secretary's report, which showed that there was a neat balance on hand in the treasury.

During the year our Water Commissioners have taken a step forward in protection of the health of our community. Possibly, nothing has brought the Town of Lindsay before the country at large to such an extent as the installation of the new ozonizing plant, in connection with our filtration system. The secretary of the Board of Water Commissioners informs me that he is receiving enquiries from many distant parts of the world as to the success of this plant, and our town is being visited by deputation after deputation from all the large cities of the United States. It is a significant fact that the town of Lindsay has the only municipal ozonizing plant on the continent. The Board of Trade has been in sympathy with this scheme from the start, and we think a very great deal of credit is due the Board of Water Commissioners for the progressive policy adopted in the management of our water works department. While it has been a debatable question as to the merits of municipal ownership and control of public utilities, so far as we have had experience in our waterworks department, it has established the fact, beyond question, that when these departments are put into the hands of thorough and competent men, the result is entirely satisfactory to the municipality.

The Municipal Council has granted a franchise to a company for the transmission of natural gas through our town. The Board of Trade will watch the efforts of this company, as they drill for gas and oil in the vicinity, with much interest. We sincerely trust they may be successful in finding this valuable product. The town of Lindsay has felt for some time that an injustice was being done us in the rate of freight on coal, as compared with neighboring towns, such as Woodville, Cannington, Cobocook, O'Neill, etc. Your Board take this opportunity of congratulating Messrs. Flavell and the Lennan upon their success in securing the Railway Commission in securing a reduction in the rate of freight on coal from Suspension Bridge to Lindsay.

Ending the management of the Board of Trade, a Winter Fair was inaugurated in Lindsay. This fair was instituted for certain purposes. That it was successful in carrying out the object of its existence has been vouched for by the merchants of Kent-st., already. Some one or two who were skeptical before, the fair was held, stated at a meeting two weeks ago that they could be counted on for increased subscriptions next year. We believe the Lindsay Winter Fair is now an established annual event. Dec. 15th, 1909, has been selected as the fair day next year.

It was my privilege last week to attend the Winter Carnival at Montreal. This popular event has behind it the same purpose exactly as our Winter Fair carried out, of course, on a much larger scale. The Ice Palace alone, in Montreal, was built at a cost of \$8000. A little money must be expended if we wish to increase our own trade.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the officers who have stood behind me throughout my term of office. I have always found every man willing to assist. Our excellent secretary, Mr. J. P. Donald, deserves my special thanks. Mr. Donald is, to my mind, the secretary of exceptional ability. He has served this board well. I take this opportunity of personally thanking him for his faithful services and the courteous manner in which he has attended to all duties, pertaining to his office. We read in the press an intimation regarding the possibility of Mr. Donald resigning his office. While, undoubtedly, there are other men, who could do the work

well, still I think that strong influence should be brought to bear on Mr. Donald to secure his services for another year.

As a Board, too, we recognize the assistance given us by the Press. All our meetings have been regularly reported, and any schemes we have wished to well advertised by people have been well advertised by the three papers. For their efficient services in this regard we tender our thanks.

Beyond a doubt, the outlook for 1909 is better than it was for 1908. We are told "The inner side of every cloud contains a silver lining." During the fall of '07, all of '08 and up to the present time, we have been laboriously working our way through the cloud; but, I am glad to say, the lining is pretty well in sight.

The reports of our banks offer encouragement to all of us here. Although, possibly, all of us have not personally experienced this condition, yet it is a fact, that money is becoming more accessible. Business houses throughout the Province, have been for two years straightening out their affairs. Every merchant in this town acknowledges that his business is really in a more healthy condition today than it has been for years. Given good crops in our Great West, and also locally, this year, 1909, should be at good year for our community.

I thank you for your courteous treatment, during my term as president, and I sincerely wish my successor and this Board of Trade great prosperity during the year to come. All of which is respectfully submitted.

Dr. Kaiser and Mr. McCutcheon, of Oshawa, be heard in regard to a proposition they had re the gas question. A report will be found in another column of the discussion that followed his motion.

On motion Messrs. H. J. Lytle and W. Flavell were appointed by the Board of Trade to represent the board on the town council committee to investigate the matter of securing municipal lighting for the town of Lindsay.

After hearing the proposition made by Mr. Weldon, the meeting was brought to a close.
