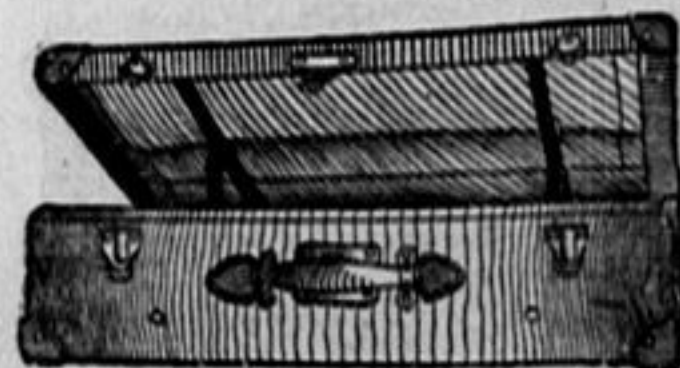

**Lindsay Six up In Contest Yesterday**

The McDiarmid-McFadyen cup competition between Fenelon Falls and Lindsay clubs started at Peel-st. rink this morning on good keen ice. Skips Wallace, of Lindsay, and Hamilton, of the Falls, had a battle royal on ice No. 3, Rev. Wallace winning by two points. On ice No. 4 Skips Millar of Lindsay, and Bishop of Fenelon Falls, played a close game, with the 5 man returned the win by 3 points, making a total margin of 6 points for Lindsay.

On ice No. 3 each made a four end to start with. The early part of the game looked bad for Lindsay and when Lindsay lost an easy five end their stock dropped considerable as Fenelon increased their lead by two. Skip Wallace was not to be beaten by a couple of healthy ends and a one tied the score. With one end to play the score was a tie. By constant curling the Lindsay rink landed two, making the final score 16-14.

Over on ice No. 4 the battle was hard fought from start to finish, each rink taking a turn at using the chalk with no larger than a three end, which was made by the Millar men on the third end. At the end of the twelfth end the score was a

tie. Millar scored five on the lucky thirteenth and one on the fourteenth. Bishop came back with three on the fourteenth. Then came the exciting moment. Lindsay were lying shot and Fenelon owned the next three stones in the ring. "Bob," had his royal well guarded, but to make sure called to his vice, Terry, for another guard.
