Perkins and Davey—that the auditor's report of the books of the treasurer for the municipality of Laxton, Digby and Longford, for the year 1910 be received and adopted.—Carried.

Campbell and Sullivan—that the books be an order on the treasurer of \$30 in favor of John Hagerman for printing the books of the treasurer of the municipality for the year 1911.—Carried.

Campbell and Davey—that John T. Perkins be and is hereby authorized to notify the owners of certain lots obstructing the roadway north of the village of Norland, to have them removed at once.—Carried.

Davey and Perkins—that the revise and councillors receive their pay to date, and that the revise issue an order on the treasurer for same.—Carried.

J. B. Campbell and C. Sullivan—that the clerk be instructed to get 200 copies of the abstract statement of the auditor's report of the year 1910 for further distribution.—Carried.

Campbell and Sullivan—that the revise give his order on the treasurer in favor of R. H. Southern, (clerk) for \$240, two dollars and forty cents, postage and stationery to date, and balance of last year's registration of births, deaths, etc.—Carried.

Davey and Sullivan—that the clerk be instructed to get 4 Health Acts and supply officers of the board with same.—Carried.

Perkins and Davey—that the assessor receive \$5 in addition to his salary as assessor for assessing all the dogs owned in the municipality of Laxton, Digby and Longford.—Carried.

Perkins and Davey—that this council adjourn, to meet again on Saturday, May 27th, 1911, to hold Court of Revision, at the hour of 10 o'clock a. m.



The Town of Lindsay recently advertised bonds for sale to the amount of \$55,000, four per cent school bonds. C. P. R. Line Between Toronto and Montreal

In connection with the Watchman's article on the C.P.R. in Ontario yesterday the following item from the Montreal Star will be read with interest:

There is evidence a good deal more behind the big developments which the C.P.R. is planning in Toronto than the mere improvement of terminal facilities in that city.

It has already been announced that the company is planning to take a much larger share of the Niagara Falls tourist traffic than in the past by building its own connections between Toronto and the Falls and also between Woodstock, on its main line to Chicago, and the Falls.

Now comes the announcement of an important new line which will cut into all the prosperous towns and cities along the shore of Lake Ontario between Montreal and Toronto, tapping, among other places, Belleville, Cobourg, Port Hope, Bowmansville, Oshawa and Whitby.

The new line will commence at Bathurst, ten miles west of Smith's Falls, and proceed southwesterly to Belleville.

The whole of this new line, it is stated, will be double-tracked, and as the line between Smith's Falls and Montreal is double-tracked already, the C.P.R. will have a double track the whole of the way between this city and Toronto, and an alternative route between Smith's Falls and Toronto and will reach all the important industrial communities between Montreal and Toronto now served by the Grand Trunk alone.

It is stated that the Railway Committee at Ottawa yesterday approved the route of this new line, so that the C.P.R. is now in a position to start its construction immediately. An incentive for pushing on the work with all possible speed is the fact that the Canadian Northern is
