

Lesson IV.—First Quarter, For Jan. 28, 1912.

THE INTERNATIONAL SERIES.

Text of the Lesson, Luke ii, 25-28. Memory Verses, 25-30—Golden Text, Luke ii, 30, 31. R. V.—Commentary Prepared by Rev. D. M. Stearns.

Being made under the law to redeem them that were under the law.
