"Dr. Miles' Nervine \$2,000,000 FOR TRENT CANAL LINDSAY TO GET ITS SHARE

For some time past the Lindsa y papers (both The Warder and the Post) have been boosting hard for Lindsay, and rightly so, for we believe that in Lindsay we have a town well worth boosting, populated with the cream of the land. We felt that the Post had surely turned from its old path of fault-finding and assuredly joined the ranks of the boosters, but alack and alas, articles printed in the Post during the last two or three weeks have compelled us to change our opinion again-our cotem has fallen lack into its waywardness and is knocking Lindsay.

A week or so ago the Post printed an article, two column wide, with the following caption in large letters: " Not a Thing for Lindsay," and the article was given all the circulation the Post was capable of giving. The article in question was as follows, and The Warder wishes to nail it on the head as not only being untrue, but that in publishing it the Post knocked the town of Lindsay:

"The first named estimates of the Borden Government were laid on the table of the House on Wednesday afternoon. The Post has looked over the items, and finds that although the Minister of Militia is from this town, not a dollar is appropriated for improvements to our post office, the Scugog river, or for the erection of an armory. Other towns have received rich plums, but Lindsay has been overlooked."

Then again, in the issue of the Post last week there appeared under the heading, the following misleading and un rue statement " No money for the Trent Canal " :

Kingston, Ont., Jan. 23. - The statement is made here that a Minister of the Crown has intimated that the government will not spend any money either on the Georgian Bay or Trent Valley canal, but that the Welland canal enlargements will be pushed with all speed, to meet the needs of navigation.

In the above item the Post makes the statement that they looked over the estimates and could find nothing whatever for Lindsay, and nothing for the Trent canal., That is to say, the Post looked over the figures given in the Toronto newspapers, but never thought it worth while to make enquiries from the department at Ottawa; the editor took the figures of a Toronto reporter in preference to the figures of the estimates as brought before the House.

The truth of the matter is that the present Government has set aside one of the largest amounts ever placed in the estimates for work to be done on the Trent Valley canal, and that the estimates as brought down, and which by this time have been probably voted on and passed in the House, call for an expenditure of over \$2,000,-

000 on the Trent Valley canal. \$2,000,000 is a lot of money and no mistake, but it should be remembered that there are twelve representatives, including Col. the Hon. Sam. Hughes, in the House at Ottawa in the present Government from ridings bordering on the Trent canal. They are all interested in the Trent canal, and in their constituencies.

In the estimates brought down, \$1,900.000 has been set aside for construction work on T. V. canal, and \$20,000 to meet damages incurred from drowned lands caused by flooding. \$20,000 has also been set aside for the building of a new bridge across the Trent river at Frankfort, while \$41,500 has been set aside chargeable to income. This latter amount (\$41,500) includes some \$12,000 or \$15,000 which will be spent at Lindsay in dredging the channel of the Scugog river, and improving a number of the lighthouses. New lighthouses will also be erected, one large one to be built at Sturgeon Point. New lighthouses will also be erected on Lake Simcoe. \$125,000 has also been set aside for maintenance and repairs.

In fact there never has been a government that has dealt more liberally for the Trent canal than the present Borden Government, and Col. the Hon. Sam. Hughes, Minister of Militia and Defence, representing the riding of Victoria and Haliburton, is to be commended for the activity and interes t he has manifested, and for securing such a liberal grant for the work not only at Lindsay and this section of the Trent canal, but for work along the entire route. As stated before over \$2,000,000 is to be expended on the Trent

canal, and this amount is to be expended before March 31, 1913. Yet the Post maintains that there is nothing in the estimates for Lindsay, nor the Trent canal.

Citizens of Lindsay will recognize at once that Lindsay is to receive a rich plum in the dredging of the Scugog river, and it is also expected that a new cement dock will be built at Lindsay. Lindsay, it will be noticed, is not faring so badly, but rather has been well
