Constable Short Exonerated by the Town Council --Number of Witnesses Stated That Winn was Hard to Handle--Joke Caused Whole Trouble

A special meeting of the town council was held in the clerk's office Monday at 7.30. The following members were present: Mayor Wood, Babcock, Smale, Dobson, Brown, Howe, Horn, Gray, Lewis, McWaters and McClery. The meeting was called for the purpose of investigating certain charges which have been placed against Night Constable Short with the chairman of the police committee, Ald. Horn in the chair. Mr. Short appeared. The chairman stated Mr. Short was charged with "Using undue severity in arresting a prisoner, and for using his baton."

In conclusion Constable Short said the man had a big fur cap on, "and I could not hurt him," and on the chief showing the kind of baton used, Mr. Short claimed his weapon was softer than Chief Chilton's. The next witness called was Fred Taylor, Jr. To Chairman Horn he said: "Winn was swearing and told me to go to h---. I told him to desist, but to me he seemed more drunk than crazy. He swore at Short and told him he could not arrest him. Winn also kicked and punched at me and tore my coat. I did not wait upon him. Short cannot say that he kicked the policeman. I did not see Short hit him. I saw Foster come in and help to take Winn out."

Chief Chilton explained the impropriety used and said there were about 700 people. "I had a trouble with the prisoner in the lock-up, but I threw my arm around him and put him down. I put him in the cell until his cousin came. I saw Dr. Blanchard and he said he did not think the cur on the prisoner's head were serious. I had no trouble handling the prisoner. I think it angered the prisoner to beat him on the head. When I am without the nippers I engage a rig to take prisoners to the lock-up. Short told me he was tired out when I took Winn over. I have made over 75 arrests and I have never yet used a baton. I only carry it in case of emergency. The prisoner's head was all swelled and rough and it appeared to me like a piece of raw beef."
