FOUND UNCONSCIOUS.

North Bay, Feb. 4.—Fred Yearley is under arrest at Warren in connection with the death of his wife, which occurred at Sudbury hospital this morning, and he will be taken to Sudbury on Monday if committed for trial at the preliminary hearing. Yearley has made no statement, and will not admit that he knows anything of the circumstances which resulted in his wife's death. Mrs. Yearley has been subject to spells when her mind seemed to be unbalanced, and one of these occurred about a week ago. Her husband, who was working in lumber shanties, was sent for, and came home. Five children, ranging from two months to ten years of age, were taken charge of by the neighbors while the mother was ill. When her husband returned, she wanted the children at home, but he refused, and the couple had words over this. On Saturday morning, observing the reflection of fire from the windows, neighbors entered the house and found Mrs. Yearley unconscious on a blazing bed. Upon being rescued and cared for, she recovered consciousness, and said that her husband had beaten her on the head with a hammer, poured coal oil on her bed, and set it on fire. She repeated this story several times in her conscious periods. Her skull was found to be fractured.
