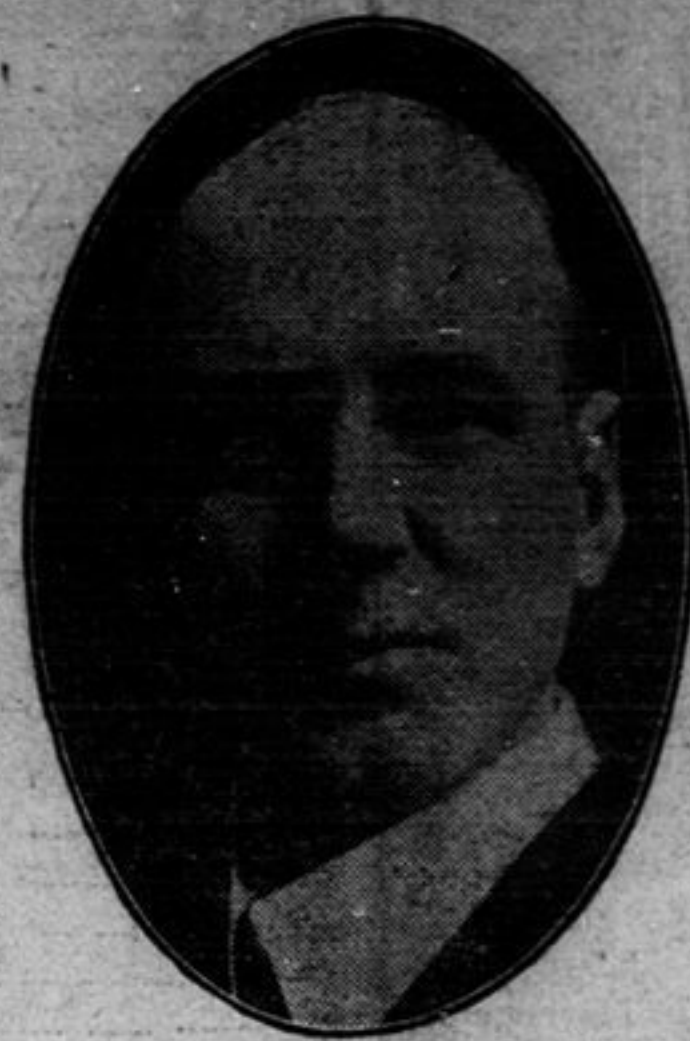

County Fathers Waiting on Hon. R. L. Borden

Warden Steele, of Eldon, passed through town on Wednesday and gave The Watchman a call before leaving for the capital at Ottawa, with the object of interviewing Hon. R. L. Borden, in regard to granting federal aid for the improvement of highways in the dominion. The warden expected to join Reeve Babcock, of Lindsay, and Duncan Tolmie, reeve of Fenelon, in Toronto on Wednesday night, when they will journey together in the same sleeper to Ottawa, arriving there on Thursday morning. The McLaren creek bridge will be another vital question discussed by our county delegates, while convening with the administrators of dominion affairs.

Following payment of members, the Irish Nationalist M.P.'s are now required to contribute \$250 a year towards the home rule fund.

A resident of Cross Creeks informed The Watchman, that wild ducks have been around the waters all winter. This is something never known to have happened in the memory of any resident before. The birds are large black ones and appear quite tame, it being possible to approach within a few yards of them at times. 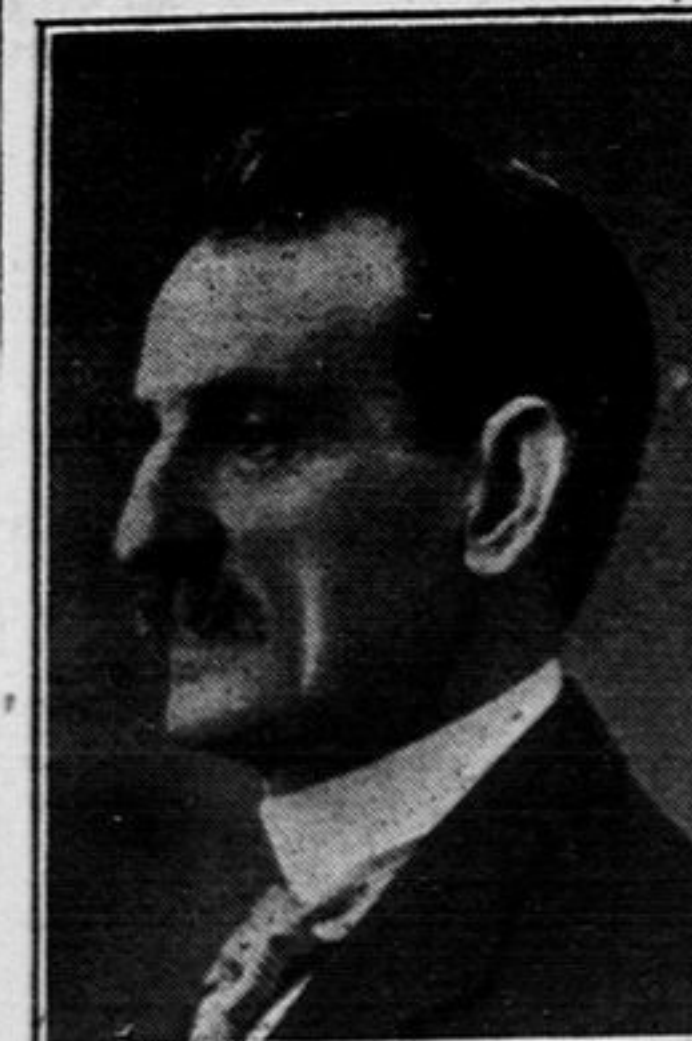
