The average price of veal calves was \$4 per cwt., and the range in prices from \$4 to \$5 per cwt. Sheep and Lambs. Sheep, ewes, sold at \$4 to \$4.50; rams, \$3 to \$3.50; lambs sold at \$4 to \$4.50. Not many choice lambs are coming, and a few being wanted, that class advanced, but if there should be a decent-sized run come forward, look out for a tumble in prices.

Hogs. The hog market is firm at steady prices. Selects, \$6.50, fed and watered, and \$6.25. L.o.b. cars at country points, and we heard of \$6.25 being paid.
