BOBCAYGEON.

Bobcaygeon, Feb. 3. — The second round in the Fenelon Falls-Bobcaygeon Trophy games was played on Thursday afternoon. Two rinks from here skipped by E. J. Broad and W. A. Davis, playing in Fenelon Falls, against Skips Robson and Stanton, were up two. Broad was two up and Davis a tie, while the Graham-Amilton rink from Fenelon put it over Dr. Fallis here by four, and C. Frost won from George Moore by two. Fenelon Falls was four on the first round and four on the second round, making eight up all round, thus assuring the trophy a change of residence to the Cataract Village for the next twelve months. It is also understood that a Shield is being put up by Dr. R. M. Mason, M. P., to be competed for by single rinks. No definite arrangements have yet been taken.

Four rinks from Lindsay came here yesterday evening and curled the locals, winning by 16. J. W. (C.P.R.) Anderson had a through ticket as usual and curled the local C. P. R. agent, R. J. Green, a runaway race, winning by 24 to 6. The other rinks were more even. Thos. Gage's Lank of Montreal rink won out in the last two ends from the local Bankers skipped by H. O. Boyd, by 14 to 10. T. J. Tilly lost to H. Mark by 10 to 13 and T. A. Fisher lost to A. E. Bottum by 15 to 18. Total score 68 to 47 in Lindsay's favor. The return game will be played later.

Six rinks of local curlers are going to Peterboro by private car on Wednesday evening to play a friendly game with that club and to play the first round in the Bottum-Fitzgerald trophy, returning next day at noon.

Preparations are under way for the local bonspiel to commence here on the 13th inst. A good list of prizes are offered and no doubt many visiting rinks will take part in thespiel.

The Boy Scouts first game of the season was played in the rink here last Saturday with the Fenelon contingent and were defeated by 5 to 2. The return game was played this afternoon, the Scouts from here playing in Fenelon Falls and so far as we are aware met defeat by the score of 4 to 2. The boys play good hockey for not having any practise, as no hockey is indulged in here this winter.

The Scouts will attend divine service in a body at the Methodist church on Sunday the 4th inst, at 10.30 a. m. Rev. Mr. Honey will preach the service.

All winter a loon has been making a home for itself in the waters of the river here. It had become quite tame and would not be molested in the least by any person who was at all anxious to watch him as he went quietly about his business—sometimes diving then again swimming peacefully on the bosom of the river all unconscious of those who were eager to get a good look at such a majestic bird. Not long ago his life was shorted by a gun shot. A local hunter standing on the Forest House bridge, as we are informed, and shooting down the river at the bird as he swam. The shot was not fatal and for a day or so he lived but swam back up stream and waded out into the snow along the river bank at the back of George Humphreys residence. There he sat. Mr. Sidney Claxton, noticing the bird, and believing him frozen into the ice and snow put on a pair of rubber boots and went out to release the poor loon, but the cruel shot had done the work, tearing away a portion of the bird's breast and he was stark and cold in the snow when his rescuer came. It does seem nothing short of cruelty to shoot a poor innocent bird which molests no person; a bird which we understand is protected by the law from destruction, a bird which is all too rare among us and will be rarer still unless a much needed lesson is meted out to those gun handlers, who, whether it is from the lust of shooting at every innocent thing in creation to satisfy their cravings or to show their marksmanship, we know not, but, nevertheless, cannot resist the temptation to destroy innocent life and take the opportunity whenever it occurs. To such, for the protection of our depleting birds, a rigid enforcement of the game laws would be perhaps the best means of securing what only common sense teaches us, to protect our birds and they will in turn protect us.

Announcement is made that Rev. F. L. Mr. Barber has been a very energetic pastor during his sojourn here and quite popular, not only with his own, but other congregations, and Picton's gain will be Bobcaygeon's loss.
