Sugar Advanced Another Ten Cents

Sugar advanced another ten cents Saturday and it was announced that a similar increase might be made again shortly. This follows out the market indications that were given a short time ago in these columns. The local price is now \$5.68 per cwt. in bags, wholesale, or \$5.73 in barrels for the first grade granulated. It is estimated that the visible supply is two million tons short and this fact alone would strengthen the market in the face of normal conditions. But just now there are additional sources of strength. The international meeting in Brussels, this week has not expressed a willingness to allow Russia export the 500,000 tons of its surplus as desired although 150,000 tons may be exported but this will have but little effect on the world's market in view of the other conditions. The Cuban crop, which is now being ground, is reported to be under the estimate that was formed. The representative of a wholesale house, stated that he expected sugar to go higher than last year, if present indications materialize. It is possible that the fact that Russia will not be allowed the amount asked for has lent strength to the present situation.

Cincinnati's Municipal Laundry. Cincinnati has opened a municipal laundry, where poor women of the tenement districts may take the family clothing and do their own washing with the aid of the most up to date machinery. The equipment includes enough power washers, driers and electric irons to accommodate fifty family washings each week, and the city is preparing to build more laundries of like nature. The idea originated with the board of health, which was quick to recognize the sanitary advantages derived from removing clothes washing operations from the living and sleeping rooms of the tenement dwellers.—Exchange.

A Man of Money. James Heenan, who is said to have carried more cash through New York's financial district than any other man living, celebrated his eighty-first birthday anniversary recently. Mr. Heenan has been in charge of the vaults of a New York bank for fifty-seven years continuously. In the days before the establishment of the clearing house balances had to be settled in gold, and Mr. Heenan carried about large sums daily. In later years he has carried as much as \$4,000,000 in greenbacks on some of his trips to the subtreasury.

DAM BURST

Vancouver, Feb. 11.—The bursting of a dam at a small lake near Union Bay on Saturday let loose an immense flood of water, which coursed down the valley, destroying forty-five dwellings, with a property loss variously estimated at between \$20,000 and \$30,000. Seven persons, all of whom are believed to be Chinese, are missing. The accident occurred at about 5.30 p.m., when through the heavy rains the dam, used by the Canadian Colliers, and owned by Mackenzie & Mann in generating power for their plant at Union Bay, collapsed.

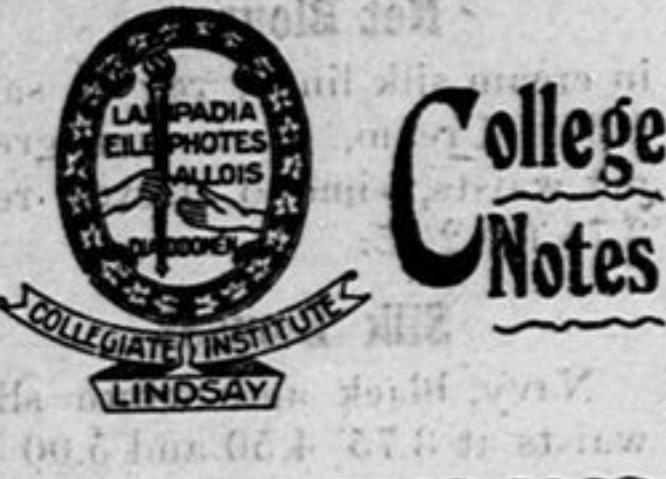

New Ways to Use Cranberries.

For strained cranberry sauce boil a quart of cranberries in two cupsful of water until they are tender. Then strain them through a colander to remove the skins, return to the fire, add a pound of granulated sugar, boil for five minutes and turn into molds.

For cranberry jelly boil two quarts of cranberries in a quart of water until they are tender and then strain them through a bag. Heat the juice and add to each pint of it a pound of granulated sugar thinned with water. Stir until the sugar is dissolved, but do not boil. Turn into jelly glasses or molds.

Preserved cranberries are a convenience when a little sauce is wanted and the fresh fruit is not at hand. Three cupsful of water are needed for each quart of fruit and a pound of sugar. Heat the sugar in the berries, and as soon as it boils turn in the berries. Cook until the skins crack—no longer; take out the fruit with a skimmer and turn into a jar. Boil the juice for four minutes longer, turn it over the berries and seal.

A delicious shortcake may be made with the usual biscuit or cake foundation and any cranberry sauce. The one in which the fruit is whole makes the most sightly cake. Cranberry pie with raisins is one of the holiday pastries on Cape Cod. Fill a crust with a cupful of raw cranberries, half a cupful of seeded raisins, a cupful of granulated sugar, a heaping tablespoonful of flour and a teaspoonful of vanilla. Strap or cover it and bake slowly.

Cranberry jelly for the roast course may come to the table filled into tart cases. Cranberries added to the cottage pudding recipe in the proportion of half as much of the fruit as of the sugar makes a delicious variation.
