WORK FOR THE CHILDREN'S AID

Two or Three Cases Need Careful Attention

The Children's Aid Society met the council chamber on Monday 4.30 p.m. The Vice-President, Mr. John Rogers, in the chair, There were present Mrs. Sharpe, Mrs. Geo. Rea, Mrs. G. A. Milne, Miss Wilkin-Rustad, Messrs. James Gillogly, G. A. Jordan, R. Kylie, Geo. Rea, Mr. Balfour, Chief Chilton, and an Ensign representing the Salvation Army.

Three cases came before the Soc iety for consideration. One family resides in the east ward, and irom statements made by some of the speakers, a deplorable state of affairs exist.

Another case of a boy in the south ward who is bordering on 14 years of age, and who has played truant for many weeks was discussed, but no conclusion was arrived at.

Mr. Rogers spoke in high terms of the boys aptitude as a student, but informed the Society that he was powerless to do any more than had been his wish to do.

It is probable Chief Chilton wil look into the matter.

A third case came from Cameron. The mother being unable to charge of her two children, 1 a boy, of seven years and a girl of five. In the latter case the father of these children is a wealthy farmer, but for certain reasons will not recognize his ousprings.


