## OBITUARY.

**LATE GEO. A. SIMPSON.**  
In the passing away of the late Mr. Geo. Arthur Simpson, at his late residence, York-st., Monday evening, Lindsay loses one of its best citizens, and although death was not entirely unexpected, (the deceased having been ailing for several years) his many friends did not look for so sudden an end. The late George Simpson for five years past has been suffering from that painful and dreaded disease known as Bright's Disease, and during the last two years he has been practically an invalid. At times his condition would be very much improved, and he was able to go out driving and on such occasions his friends were always pleased to shake his hand and notice his apparently improved condition. However, the disease was deep-rooted and despite careful attention of the medical men, the kind assistance of nurses and the loving aid rendered by the members of the family, he passed away, death occurring about eight o'clock Monday evening.

The late Mr. Simpson was born in the City of Peterboro just 44 years and four months ago, and after spending his boyhood days in the Electric City, moved with his parents to Bobcaygeon, where his father conducted the Forest House with much credit to himself, the hotel being known as one of the best. After the death of Mrs. Simpson, the deceased along with his brother, Mr. W. H. Simpson, moved to Fenelon Falls, where they became proprietors of the Mansion House, now known as the Twomey House. Here again they established one of the best hotels in the district. After spending about five years in the Cataract Village the two brothers moved to Lindsay, becoming proprietors of the Simpson House, in which town he has lived ever since. The Hotel Simpson, like the other two hostleries at once became one of the best hotels in Lindsay and for that matter one of the best east of Toronto.

During his sojourn in Lindsay the deceased made many warm friends by reason of his affable disposition and temperate habits. He took considerable interest in the affairs of the town, although modest and retiring in his manner. If he had any particular "hobby," it was a love for good, thoroughbred horses. The late Mr. Simpson was the Secretary-Treasurer of the Lindsay Winter Racing Association, and for years a Director of the Lindsay Central Exhibition. He was to be found at the fall fairs as a judge of horses as well as a judge at racing meets, and his judgment was sound and impartial.

In his demise the family and relatives have the sincerest sympathy of the citizens of Lindsay in general. He leaves to mourn his loss his wife (formerly Miss Minnie McSweeney, a daughter of the late Magistrate McSweeney), and one son John, of the C.N.R. office staff, Toronto; one sister, Mrs. E. H. Dunham, of Montreal who has been waiting on her brother during his illness of the last two months; two brothers, Messrs. W. H. Simpson, of Lindsay, and J. J. B. Simpson, of Vancouver, B.C.

## The Intoxicated Passenger

There is a strong opinion prevailing among railway officials in Canada that a law should be placed on the statute books to enable railway officials to deal promptly with that not uncommon nuisance, an intoxicated passenger. Especially is some measure of protection in this respect desirable in the interests of ladies and children who may be travelling in public conveyances. When an intoxicated individual or individuals have paid their fare on a street car, or a railway train or on a steamboat they may make themselves as objectionable as they please to the other passengers, but more particularly in the case of land conveyances the officials in charge are helpless to control them except by remonstrance. At least until they have reached some point in the journey where a constable can be secured to take them in charge. Usually remonstrances on the part of a railway official only make the intoxicated person more boisterous and more objectionable.
