FAMILY RECIPES.

Cleanings From the Archives of a Practical Housewife.

The following recipes, which may be of value at this season, are favorites gleaned from an old family recipe book belonging to a housewife with practical notions.

A simple milk and potato soup that will be something hot for the children when they get home from school at noonday calls for six or eight potatoes and two onions. Boil them in enough water to cover until tender and then press them through a colander and add salt to the stove. Add a quart of boiling hot milk, season with salt, pepper and butter. Let the whole come to the boiling point, add a beaten egg if desired and serve immediately. A bit of nutmeg and lemon improves it.

A hot nourishing dish of oysters and macaroni is welcome in cold weather. Boil the macaroni until tender, put a layer of it over the bottom of a buttered baking dish, then cover with a layer of oysters, add another of macaroni, and so on until the dish is full. Season each layer with pepper and salt and also add a bit of butter. If the top layer is one of oysters sprinkle with powdered bread or cracker crumbs. If the last layer is one of macaroni the breadcrumb will not be needed. Pour in enough milk heated with a large egg to cover the contents of the dish and bake in a hot oven.

For another luncheon dish, mix a cold piece of boiled tongue. Mix it with a hot cream sauce, adding the beaten yolk of an egg to give richness. Let it simmer very slowly over the fire while some delicate slices of toast are being buttered. Cover each piece of toast with the mixture and send to the table in a covered dish.

For deviled ham, so good in sandwiches for the lunch basket, have ready a pint bowl of chopped ham, an even tablespoonful of sugar, an even tablespoonful of ground mustard, a tablespoonful of cayenne pepper and a cupful of vinegar. Mix pepper, sugar and mustard thoroughly and add the vinegar, little by little, then stir it into the chopped meat, and when a smooth mass has been formed, pack it into a tin can. It is better to use some fine pack if in tin cans and pour melted butter over the top.

Pulp From Bamboo. A British consular report, dealing with the trade of Formosa in 1910 states that the Government has this year extended its cane industry experiment, and for the production of pulp from bamboo, with an area of supply of 100 acres of growing bamboo. The market for the pulp will be Japan. The processes of manufacture are kept secret.

Former Lindsay Couple Nearly Lost Life by Escaping Gas

Suffocated by gas which poured from an open jet, a 30-year-old woman, aged 35, and her wife, formerly of Lindsay, were found unconscious in their room at 330 King-st. east Toronto, at noon Friday.

They lay last night in St. Michael's Hospital, in a very serious condition and it was uncertain what the result would be, though the woman showed more signs of recovery than the man.

A Toronto despatch says it is not rendered first aid, stated that the gas fixture was in good condition, and since the woman used a lamp because she said she did not like gas, it is hard to explain why the gas was tampered with at all. MOISTURE ON THE MOON.

Some Little Life May Still Remain in Spots on the Planet.

If the moon entirely dead, or are there still some traces of life left? Most scientists assume that it is but the skeleton of a planet, without air or water. But here and there an astronomer of rouse declares that he has discovered signs that there is still going on some sort of geological action.

The latest is Johannes Korn, who devoted a year to a study of the little crater Tragus. He claims that a week after new moon this appears as a crater full of deep shadow. But in a few days the crater is replaced by a bright spot, although the neighboring craters are easily distinguished.

A few days more and the crater reappears and doesn't change its appearance until another lunar day comes.

Professor Korn's theory is that vapor forms in the depths of Tragus during the long cold lunar night. Then, as the sun advances, the vapor warms and expands, finally filling the crater, so that it cannot be seen. Still later in the long lunar day the vapor is dissipated by the heat and the crater stands out empty and barren.

Similar conditions have been observed in other craters, always the same ones, while others near them show no changes. The conclusion this observer has reached is that there is still a little life left in a few places on the moon—that is, there is some sort of eruption of vapor.

Whether there is any animal or vegetable life is another question.—Boston Globe.

Some Little Life May Still Remain in Spots on the Planet.

If the moon entirely dead, or are there still some traces of life left? Most scientists assume that it is but the skeleton of a planet, without air or water. But here and there an astronomer of rouse declares that he has discovered signs that there is still going on some sort of geological action.

The latest is Johannes Korn, who devoted a year to a study of the little crater Tragus. He claims that a week after new moon this appears as a crater full of deep shadow. But in a few days the crater is replaced by a bright spot, although the neighboring craters are easily distinguished.

A few days more and the crater reappears and doesn't change its appearance until another lunar day comes.

Professor Korn's theory is that vapor forms in the depths of Tragus during the long cold lunar night. Then, as the sun advances, the vapor warms and expands, finally filling the crater, so that it cannot be seen. Still later in the long lunar day the vapor is dissipated by the heat and the crater stands out empty and barren.

Similar conditions have been observed in other craters, always the same ones, while others near them show no changes. The conclusion this observer has reached is that there is still a little life left in a few places on the moon—that is, there is some sort of eruption of vapor.

Whether there is any animal or vegetable life is another question.—Boston Globe.
