stands out empty and barren. Similar conditions have been observed in other craters, always the same ones, while others near them show no changes. The conclusion this observer has reached is that there is still a little life left in a few places on the moon-that is, there is some sort of eruption of vapor.

Whether there is any animal or veg-
