Prohibit Sale of Cigarettes
Ottawa, Feb. 16. — A deputation one hundred strong, representing the W.C.T.U., invaded Premier Borden's office at noon to-day and asked that the Government enact a law prohibiting in Canada the sale and manufacture of cigarettes.

Mr. Borden's reply was the quintessence of frankness. He was very much impressed, he said, with the earnestness and sincerity of the petitioners and their desire for the future greatness of the nation. He would remind them, however, that one of the very worst possible things in the way of the enacting of laws was the placing on the statute books of legislation that is not observed. He thought that the subject was one that was surrounded with difficulties, and very many things to be taken into consideration.

Mr. Borden also thought the control of parents over their children had somewhat lessened during the last twenty-five years. This, perhaps, had contributed to the growth of the evil.

In concluding Mr. Borden said that he fully realized the importance of the question, and would give it every attention.
