An Ants Sewing Circle.

A party of German naturalists recently returned from Ceylon have reported the existence of a species of ant that has been observed in the act of sewing two leaves together for the purpose of forming a nest. This report confirms the observations of the English naturalist Ridley, made in 1890. They saw a row of the insects pulling the edges of leaves together, then others trimming and fitting the edges, and finally the completion of the work by still other ants which fastened the edges with a silky thread yielded by larvae of the same species the workers carried in their mandibles. It is said that the sewing ants pass the thread-giving larvae like shuttles through holes in the edges of the leaves.—Boston Post.

Hughes Cup Hockey "Tourney"

HUNDREDS AT PRELATE'S FUNERAL

Funeral of Bishop O'Connor at Peterboro

Peterboro, Jan. 29.—Roman Catholic prelates and clergy from many points of Ontario attended the funeral of Bishop O'Connor Tuesday.

While the body was lying in state thousands of people attended St. Peter's cathedral.

Bishop Scollard, of North Bay, who preached the sermon, was the first priest ordained by the late bishop, and is now in charge of the diocese that once constituted a part of the See of Bishop O'Connor in the earlier years of his episcopacy.

All the Catholic institutions were draped, and many citizens, irrespective of religion, had flags at half-mast.

All the local Catholic societies were largely represented at the funeral, and hundreds of citizens turned out to pay their tribute of respect.

The ceremonies in the cathedral at 9.30 a.m. with Archbishop Spratt, of Kingston, as celebrant of the mass. Over 200 priests were present. Father Scanlon, of Georgetown, Ont., was deacon of the office, and Father Fitzpatrick, of Ennismore, sub-deacon. The deacons of honor were Father Kelly, of Trout Creek, and Father Roach, of Toronto. Archdeacon Casey, of Lindsay, was arch priest.

Other attending clergy were: Archbishop McNeill, of Toronto; Mgrs. McCann, Toronto; Aylward, London; Mahony, Hamilton; Choquette, St. Hyacinthe; Bishops Fallon, London; Bishop Regan, Pembroke; Bishop Budka, representing the Ruthenians in Canada, and Bishop Emard, of Valleyfield. Archbishop Bruchesi was represented by Dr. Sylvester, of Montreal. The Toronto representatives also included Dr. Kidd and Father Hand, W. McCann, Minehan and Cline.
