A Grant of \$200 for Coboconk Bridge

It was decided, on a motion being put by Com. McWatters and Southern, that Messrs. Iobson, Alton, Hill, Devitt, Varcoe and the Warden form a committee to act upon the construction of the Mud Lake Narrows bridge, to be built in Carden. To do this a by-law will be submitted changing the personnel of the previous committee.

The work in connection with the Nichols bridge, which was held over from the June session, was fully explained by Com. McWatters and a grant of \$200.00 was given to assist the township in paying the cost of building.

The bridge crosses burnt river, in the township of Somerville, and was erected by the taxpayers at a cost of \$1200. Com. Thierack and Hill moved and seconded the motion. Com. Robertson approached the council on having necessary repairs made to the east Cross Creek bridge. The bridge is in bad state of repair, owing to the piles sinking on one side, which endangers the traffic of traction engines and vehicles over it. The waters at times overflow, and children are unable to attend school owing to this inconvenience. An engineer will see to the proper construction of the bridge and make it safe for travel.

Coun. McEachern introduced the Staples bridge, and stated the structure was too small to admit of the free passage of waters. Coun. Dr. Nesbitt Dies Freed of Charges

The argument was brief, his Lordship deciding in favor of Mr. Dewart's contention that the charges of making fraudulent returns to the Government as President of the Farmers Bank, upon which Dr. Nesbitt was extradited from Chicago, were not cited in the criminal code.
