County Council in Session--Many Matters of Interest--Advancement Club ask for Grant

The second day of the County Council was occupied by the members in visiting the House of Refuge during the a.m. and also the Ross Hospital.

At 2 o'clock p.m. the legislators got down to business in the council chamber, when communications were received and different bills brought before the assembly. It was a very noticeable feature of the meeting, the dispatch with which all business was transacted. Warden Bottum proved himself to be a good leader, and his colleagues seem to imbibe his rapid method of dealing with the municipal problems.

HOUSE OF REFUGE.
The electing members on the board of management for the House of Refuge caused as much enthusiasm as that of Warden on the previous day. Reeves Varcoe, Robertson and Devitt were in the field for the position of chairman of the board of management. Reeve McKee called for a vote of the members, and after three votes being taken, Reeve Varcoe, of Mariposa, was elected, with Councillor Robertson second and Councillor Levitt third. For membership of the board of management, Councillor Robertson, Devitt and Hill were proposed, which resulted in the election of Councillor Robertson, of Ops, by 12 votes.

Reeves Kyle, Dobson and McWatters are a good trio, and are making themselves felt and heard in the council.

It was remarkable the amount of business that was transacted during the afternoon session. Clerk Mr. J. R. McNeillie had all communications in his usual good form, so that the chairmen of the different committees were enabled to deal with bills payable and reports with much rapidity.

Warden Bottum's address, re the salary of jail officials, was read, and on motion of Mulligan and Southern it was referred to the committee on finance and assessments.

A communication from Mr. J. H. Sootheran, asking that the county assume the cost of the telephone in use in his office, referred to the committee on county property.

ADVANCEMENT CLUB GRANT.
A deputation, composed of Messrs. Allan Gillies, P. J. Breen, Wellsley Staples and G. A. Matthie awaited upon the council in the interests of the Lindsay Advancement Club, asking a grant of \$100.00 towards assisting in carrying out the intentions of the club successfully.

Mr. Breen was the first speaker, and was followed by Messrs. Gillies, Staples and Matthie. Each of the speakers spoke of the excellent work done by the Club since its inauguration. The object of the members is to furnish four days of amusement to the people of the county during the month of February, when single fare tickets will be issued on all railroads entering Lindsay for a radius of 80 miles. To conduct this great winter carnival the Club needs funds, and asked that their request for \$100 be granted.

Warden Bottum considered the speeches of the four brilliant orators would have the effect of softening the members hearts, and on motion the grant will be dealt with in committee.

Councillors Varcoe and Robertson presented a bill, asking that required repairs be made to the east and west Cross Creek bridge in the Township of Ops.

Councillors Dobson and McWatters, asking for grants to the various agricultural societies.

Tompkins-Devitt--For usual grant to public library.

Varcoe-Rogers--Asking a grant for the Sick Children's Hospital.

Dobson-Kyle--That a committee be appointed to ascertain the amount to be paid Omemee and Lindsay High School Boards of Education for the maintenance of county pupils in the year 1913.

Fee-Devitt--For a grant to be given Verulam Agricultural Seed Fair.

Kyle-McWatters--That \$100.00 be given the Lindsay Advancement Club.

Rogers-Varcoe--That a grant be made to the East and West Victoria Farmers' Institute and the East and West Woman's Institute.

Robertson-Southern--That Councillor Bottum take charge of the stone crusher during the present year.

Tiers-Morrison--That departmental examinations be held in the Village of Fenelon Falls during 1913.

Chipaw-Alton--That an additional grant be made to the North Victoria Agricultural Society of \$25.00.

McKee-McEachern--Asking that the Ontario Government grant funds for the building of wire fences in Ontario.

Devitt-Tompkins--That Messrs. Chipaw, McWatters, McEachern and Rogers receive the appointment of advisory committee for the ensuing year.

Varcoe-Rogers--Asking for a grant to the Mariposa Agricultural Society.

Morrison-Tiers--Re the painting of county bridges in need of repair.

Council adjourned to 10.30 Thursday morning.

COMMITTEE BUSINESS.
The council then arose and went into committee of the whole.

The committee on printing was the first business dealt with, Reeve Devitt - Tompkins - That the report of the board of management of the house of refuge be received and read, but on further consideration it was referred to finance and assessment committee.

Kyle - McWatters - That the report of standing committee on county property be received and read.

Coun. Alton took the chair and read the report, which was adopted.

The report of the standing committee on printing, on motion of Coun. Kyle and Dobson was read by Chairman L. Fee, which was received and adopted on motion of Coun. Sootheran and Tompkins.

The report of the standing committee on appointment to office was received. Mr. Tompkins in the chair, and on his reading report it was adopted as read.

Morrison - Sootheran - That the council take into consideration the advisability of repairing roads and bridges, including Long bridge.

Fee - Mulligan - Brown's bridge repairs between Ops and Emily.

Chipaw - Sootheran - Appointing a committee to inspect Cobocook bridge known as the mill pond bridge and report at June session.

Dobson - Kyle - That a portrait of Warden Steel be procured and placed in the council chamber.

Southern - Chipaw - That a committee be appointed to inspect Victoria bridge and report at June session--Carried.

Rogers - Varcoe - That Mariposa put in an application for use of stone crusher.

COUNTY COUNCIL.
A large amount of business was transacted by the county fathers on Friday, the fourth day of the session. Many appeals which were made for grants by individuals and societies received the icy mitt of the county representatives.

Coun. Robertson and Tompkins endeavored to fix the Warden's salary, but were defeated, and it will remain in abeyance until the November session, when it will be more easy to decide the amount of work done by the Warden during the year past and recompense accordingly.

The Lindsay Pet Stock and Poultry Association received a grant of \$75, though they had asked for \$100.

The Christmas Fair Society were favored by the councillors and a grant of \$100 was given the promoters.

To the Children's Aid a \$200 contribution was granted.

Mr. Geo. Ashman, turnkey in the county jail, asked for a raise of \$75 per year.

The demand was considered by the council, but they did not favor the idea of raising the salary of one official, as in all probability this would establish a precedent which other county officers would take advantage of and look for an advance also. Mr. Ashman was well spoken of, and got the credit of being a first-class man in the position, but the members did not consider it possible to accede to his request.

The Bank Bill was given its second reading without division in the House of Commons.

A new set of regulations relating to gold and silver marks has been drawn up.

The Salvation Army campaign to raise \$100,000 in Toronto was successful.
