The barn and contents of Mr. Wilson Hamilton were completely wiped out by fire at noon today. Two cows and a horse, the latter owned by Mr. T. Flynn, were consumed in the burning building. It is supposed the fire man started from a spark from the engine as threshing operations were going on during the forenoon.

The men rushed to the burning structure, but were unable to subdue the flames which had got a good headway and were licking up everything in sight. The wind was strong and as everything was dry the flames enveloped the barn in a short space of time. The threshing machine owned by Irwin Sanderson was destroyed also. The loss will be a heavy one as nothing remains for fodder for Mr. Hamilton's cattle. The building was a good frame on a stone foundation. It is not known whether there was any insurance on the building.

\$500,000 FIRE IN BANCROFT.
The big corundum mills at Bancroft, were destroyed Sunday. The loss is estimated at \$500,000, and one hundred and sixty men are thrown out of employment. The company paid last year in wages \$120,000.

But instead of going home the little ones started out on the Lindsay road, and were not missed by their parents until dark, when search began.
