SANK VESSEL.
Owen Sound, Feb. 2.—The steamer Manitou, of the Dominion Transportation Company's fleet, lies sunk at her moorings in the harbor as the

result of a fire of unknown origin which broke out aboard her this afternoon. The blaze was a most difficult one for the firemen to handle, and owing to the density of the acrid smoke they were unable to effect an entrance between decks. Two lines of hose were piled for three hours, and the Manitou went down

until the stern rested on the harbor bottom. Gradually the whole vessel settled, and the rush of water quenched the fire, which was in the neighborhood of the engine room.
