FALL OF MAFEKING CERTAIN. Boers Are Now Preparing for a Final Assault.

London, March 12.—A correspondent of The Daily Mail at Lorenzo Marques, telegraphing Saturday says: "According to Boer reports the fall of Mafeking is certain. There has been heavy fighting this week and the Boers have been shelling the town from all the outlying forts which they have captured.
