There were too many applicants for enlistment in Toronto so Mr. Ardagh applied at Quebec and was notified late on Saturday night that he was accepted. He was unable to go to his home in Barrie to say good-bye, as he had to leave for Quebec on the 9.30 train Saturday night.

Volunteering at Quebec.

Quebec, March 12. - The acting D.O.C., Lieut.-Col. White, has already six men enlisted of the 10 men to be provided in the district of Quebec to fill the vacancies in the first Canadian contingent in South Africa. Auxiety as to Mafeking.


There is no confirmation of the rumors of the raising of the siege Mafeking, concerning which the gravest anxiety continues to be felt. British Casualties 15,677.
