PREMIER WILL NOT CHANGE TERMS OF THE LIQUOR BILL

MR. ROSS HEARS A BIG TEMPERANCE DEPUTATION

The Vote Will Not be Taken on Oct. 14th However—Likely at the Municipal Elections. SOME PLAIN DISCOURSE. The Premier Says That if the Temperance People Cannot Poll the Vote Asked, They Should Not Win.

On Wednesday of last week a deputation from the Dominion Alliance, 100 strong, men and women waited on the government to ask for changes in the terms of the proposed liquor bill. They were received by Premier Ross and all the members of his Cabinet.

Continuing, he asked those present to turn their attention for a few moments to the terms of the vote, which he considered quite fair. If 200,000 voters say that prohibition should carry it would carry. Coming down to a practical point, it meant that if three out of every eight voters on the list said they wanted prohibition they could have it.

DR. CARMAN TALKS OUT. Rev. Dr. Carman, General Superintendent of the Methodist Church, entered a very strong protest against the day of voting and the method of the vote. He could say to the government that personally he did not feel justified in going to the poll when the ballot boxes were stuffed with 200,000 votes before he got there.

THE PREMIER'S REPLY. Replying to the deputation Mr. Ross said that when the government had approached the question of "partial" prohibition, as Dr. Carman had characterized it, they were confronted with the existence of a good licence law, which would have to be dispensed with, and with the fact that the province had twice pronounced in favor of total prohibition.
