It was worth while enquiring if it were not possible for the people of cheapest lumber, and satisfaction Canada to manufacture a considerable proportion of the \$65,000,000 we take every year from the United States. It was certainly possible within a very short time, if the government would enact a sufficient system of protection to do so, and keep in this country the people who now going to the United States work in the very factories there which are turning out the articles which afterwards come to Canada to flood our markets. (Cheers.)

Our policy should be in the first place to conserve our own interests, and in the next place, as between our competitors British and foreign, our policy should be to give to the manufacturers of the Mother Country a preference over those of other countries. (Cheers.) We should not fail to remember, of course, that the Mother Country was one of our best customers, but it was a fact also that she was a good customer of the United States, having taken from that country last year \$631,000,000 only in return; a greater discroportion than Britain's trade with Can-
