OLD NEWGATE PRISON.

Relics Sold at Auction Fetched Hardly Scrap Iron Prices

Relics of old Newgate Prison were sold at auction on the afternoon of the 5th Feb., and hardly fetched the value of scrap iron. There was a large crowd of spectators present, including a number of Americans, but the bidding was very slack. There was some competition for the old oak, the hangman's key and the cupboard mentioned in "Barnaby Rudge," which brought \$62.50. The old death bell fetched \$500. The staff on which the black flag was hoisted went for \$60; copper wash-bowls used by the prisoners were sold for \$5 each; nine plaster heads of persons executed were knocked down at \$25, and the main entrance door, which was broken down by the Gordon rioters, brought \$150.

Newgate Prison, with the historic sessions house, known as the Old Bailey, in the heart of the city of London, which may be compared with the Bastille of Paris, or the Tombs of New York, will have soon completely vanished, to make room for the new Central Criminal Court. The old jail was a massively built, of stone, and immensely strong, though not impregnable, as many prisoners managed to effect their escape from its gloomy interior. It dated only from 1770, and was much damaged in the London "No Popery" riots, ten years later, which make the most picturesque episodes in Dickens' "Barnaby Rudge." The rioters then battered in the door and released the prisoners. Lord George Gordon, the fanatic ringleader, was himself confined in the building on the reconstruction.

PROHIBITS RAILWAY STRIKES.

Railway Men in Holland Test Legality of National Statute.

Amsterdam, Feb. 23.—With the object of preventing the adoption of the proposed law prohibiting railway strikes, all railroad employees of Holland have decided to cease work to test its virtue. At a meeting of the Workingmen's Union, which represents 90,000 men, it was decided to support such action. The date of the strike, however, has not yet been announced. The situation locally, meanwhile is critical. Trains cannot enter or leave Amsterdam, and additional troops are here to avoid possible trouble. At a meeting of the Workingmen's Union, held yesterday, it was decided to support the railway men in their strike, the object of which was to prevent the adoption of the proposed law which prohibits railway strikes.

Danville, Va., March 11.—A south-bound Southern Railway fast passenger train standing at this station Florida Flyer yesterday. Two passengers were killed.

Reserves From Constantinople. Constantinople, March 11.—Two thousand Redis (Turkish reserves) from Asia Minor, and large supplies of ammunition, have been despatched from here to Monastir, Macedonia.

MORGAN-VAN HORNE SCHEME.

Sir William has an Option on Every Cuban Company. Boston, March 3.—A Transcript special from Havana, to-day says that J. Pierpont Morgan's visit there is in connection with the scheme of Sir William Van Horne to bring about the consolidation of the several railway interests of Cuba.

Sir William has already obtained an option on every electric plant tramway and railway on the island except the Cardenas-Julcaro Railroad, and he is negotiating for that.
