TWO KILLED IN C.P.R. WRECK

Five Others Injured in Freight Train Head-on Collision.

Remains of the Accident Horribly Scalded - Two Engines Wrecked and Six Cars With Their Contents Destroyed - Collision Occurred Near Islington, Nine Miles From Toronto - Youthful Operator Is Blamed.

Toronto, March 18.—Two men killed, a third very badly burned and three others slightly injured, by a head-on collision between two freight trains on the C.P.R. near Islington, a small town nine miles west of Toronto.

The Dead. David Taylor, brakeman, 22 years of age, unmarried, lives in London, Ont.

The Injured. William Morrison, engineer, 34 years of age, married, living in West Toronto, badly scalded about the hands and face, and suffering from shock, will probably recover.

Operator's Error the Cause. According to an official of the company, the operator of the freight train was responsible for the collision.

Scene of the Wreck. The collision occurred at 6.30 yesterday morning, and was between the Teeswater freight extra, running west, and a Windsor freight eastward, No. 52, known as the beef train. The Teeswater freight had just crossed the high Humber bridge, and the two trains crashed together.

Horrible Burns and Scalds. The crew of the engine on the beef train crew all horribly burned and scalded. They were caught underneath the wreck, and inhaled the escaping steam, burning their throats and lungs and scalding them about the body.

The Inquest. The coroner Crawford opened an inquest at 8 o'clock last evening at the Michael's hospital on the bodies of David Taylor and William Morrison. The inquest was held in the presence of a large number of witnesses.

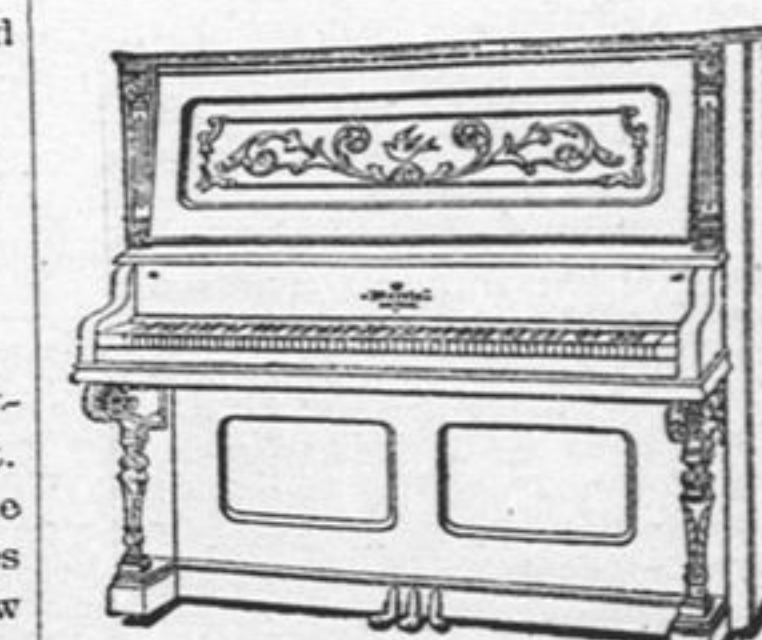
