ANOTHER MAN IN A WELL

A Globe despatch from Galt dated Tuesday says: The Joshua Sandford episode almost found a parallel here this afternoon, when James Morgan, an old man of seventy, was buried half way down a fifteen-foot well. The accident occurred at 3 o'clock, and it was 6.30 before he was released. Morgan was cleaning out the quicksand in the well on Robert Brydon's farm, a mile northwest of the town. While working he loosened the stone curling of the well, and it caved in. He noticed it which he was lowered.
