LAZY DAY IN THE ASSEMBLY

Only Two Speeches on the Gamey Charges Monday Afternoon.

Mr. George F. Graham of Brockville spoke for the Government for Two Hours, and Mr. Crawford in His Reply, said the Brockville Orator Had Been So Indefinite That It Was Hard to Say Where He Stood.

Toronto, March 24.—Yesterday was a listless day in the Legislature. Only two speeches were given. Mr. Graham of Brockville, in defence, and Mr. Crawford of West Toronto on the attack. To-day Mr. Foy will move his amendment to relegate the Gamey charges to the Committee on Privileges and Elections.

Hon. Raymond Prefontaine, Minister of Marine, and George D. Grant, the new member for North Ontario in the Dominion Parliament, occupied seats on the floor of the house. The Speaker announced that he had been legally notified of the vacancy in North Renfrew, and he had instructed the clerk to issue a writ for a new election.

Mr. Graham of Brockville. The debate on the Gamey charges was continued by Mr. Graham of Brockville. He said that a great change had come over the gentlemen opposite in their attitude towards the judiciary. He had intended to confine himself to the question at issue, but the member for North Toronto had gone unreasonably far in his statements. Dr. Nesbitt had described the Government as a cringing, crawling, crawling Government, and had complained of his position as a back benchman for that. They would like to see Dr. Nesbitt leader of the Opposition from a party standpoint. Dr. Nesbitt had made an uncalled for attack on Mr. Marter, a man who was big enough to be chosen leader of the Conservative party in succession to the present Chief Justice of the Province of Ontario. Mr. Marter said the position of Mr. Marter as explained in the House last session. He (Mr. Marter) had bought stock in a pulp concern after concessions had been granted to that company by the Government, just as any other man in the province was entitled to do.

He remembered when the member for North Toronto was willing to be sacrificed himself to run as an independent candidate against the Conservative candidate in Algoma, and these men who he condemns now, Duncan Bole and "Capt." Sullivan, were the main spokes in the wheel which attempted to get him the nomination in North Toronto.

Accounting For Bye-Elections. The victory of Mr. Clark in Centre Bruce was Clarksonian, and not Whitneyite. The member for North Toronto was sent into North Norfolk in the bye-elections, and the speaker read a letter written by Dr. Nesbitt appealing for "workers" who would be "hustlers." After naming some of the men imported into North Norfolk he read a paragraph from the "only Conservative paper published in Essex County," describing two of them, and saying that if Mr. Whitney had men like those named helping him he would never grace the seat now occupied by Mr. Ross.

Mr. Graham was not disposed to hold up the Provincial Secretary as a martyr, and denounce the member for Manitoulin as a bad man, but he thought the Conservatives were making a mistake in holding up the opportunity of proving his charges. The Provincial Secretary was entitled to a fair trial. He did not believe in Lynch law, in condemning a man until he has been tried. The newspapers had made a mistake in attempting to introduce Lynch law into Ontario.

Going back to the bribery charges were got entirely analogous to the present case. When the money was placed in the Speaker's hands and a resolution was passed to impound it with all the documents relating to the charge. In the present case the money had not been delivered up, but some of the Conservative speakers had gone so far as to impugn the honor of the Speaker, by saying the documents might be consumed as the West Elgin ballots had been consumed.

All Disqualified. Mr. Graham went over the list of Conservative members to adduce the argument that they had disqualified themselves from acting on the jury, and he included one or two on the Government side who had pre-judged the case against or for the accused. There ought to be a change of venue since it would be impossible to find an impartial jury from the members of the House.

Was it true that courts of justice were not courts of justice, but just whitewashing courts as alleged? Mr. St. John—Does the hon. gentleman argue that the commission is a commission for trial?

Mr. Graham—It is an investigation under the laws of Ontario, passed for that purpose and assented to by Sir William Meredith.

Mr. St. John—Is the commission proposed a tribunal?

Mr. Graham—The hon. gentleman should buy a dictionary. This is a mere play upon words.

The member for Brockville went on to argue that commissions could bring in a finding.

The Opposition did not wish to drag the judiciary into this affair. That is what the judges are for, to settle disputes which cannot be settled in any other way. When the charges were made against Sir Adolphe Caron there was no such machinery to try such cases as we have in this province. When the statute which governs such cases was passed, Sir William Meredith, the leader of the

Conservative party at that time, did not even divide the House on it. Mr. Graham apologized for talking about two hours.

Mr. Crawford Replies. Mr. Crawford (West Toronto) did not think the preceding speaker had shown that he fully realized the gravity of the situation. After listening to the lengthy argument of the member for Brockville he was convinced that there was something in the rumors that had been going about that he (Mr. Graham) had taken some time to consider as to whether he would stand up and support the Government in its present position. He was not yet what form of investigation the member for Brockville favored.

The speaker answered the Essex paper quoted by Mr. Graham by saying it was not considered to be a Conservative paper, and it had opposed Dr. Reaume, the sitting member for South Essex.

The defeat of the Government candidate in Centre Bruce could not be assigned to the allegation that the Conservative temperance people would not vote for a Liberal pledged to the temperance platform. There was another matter that contributed to that result, which was the breach of faith of the Liberals in ignoring the signature of Hon. Richard Harcourt, agreeing to saw-off the protest in Centre Bruce against the protest in Monday. The speaker called the attention of the House to the examination of Dr. Stewart, who was Mr. Clark's opponent in Centre Bruce. Under oath Dr. Stewart said he did treat a good deal, and he was unable to say that he did not treat a good deal during the time preceding the election in May last. That was the testimony of the gentleman who swallowed the temperance platform and asked the temperance people to support him. It was to the credit of the electors of Centre Bruce that in view of the testimony of this man taken under oath they had no confidence in him or in the Liberal party that they would carry out any of the pledges they had made.

Respect For Judiciary.

Mr. Crawford then went on to deal with the high character of the judiciary. He had no desire to impugn the integrity of the judges, but they had given decisions which had to some extent shaken the confidence of the people—decisions which indicated that they acted as though they felt it to be their duty to sustain the present Government in power. The judges named in the instructions were men of the highest standing. They were men known to have taken an active part in connection with commissions, some of whose findings have not yet been reported. He was not in a position to say that they were not right, but he was pointing out to the judges what they can do. The trial could not be any more or less than a farce because of the restrictions thrown around it. It could be nothing more nor less than a whitewash. The judges would sit and report, and nothing more than report. It would be impossible for them to render judgment because they would be restricted in power.

It was a most important question. He had not lost confidence in the Legislature, and he believed there was a sufficient number on both sides of the House to conduct a proper investigation, and he appealed to the leader of the Government to agree to have the fullest investigation into the affair.

J. S. Duff (West Simcoe) moved the adjournment of the debate at 6 o'clock.

ELECTION PETITIONS.

One Filed Against Hon. E. J. Davis—Appeal of Mr. Miscampbell.

Toronto, March 24.—As a result of the meeting of North York Conservatives held at Newmarket on March 14 a protest against the election of Hon. E. J. Davis was yesterday filed at Osgoode Hall by Christopher Kennedy and Uriah Marsh of Whitchurch and W. H. Proctor of King, all farmers, on behalf of T. H. Lennox. The petition charges every possible kind of election wrong-doing, but no specific personal charges against the Minister are yet announced, but his disqualification for the space of eight years will be asked for. The petition is very general in names or dates are not given as yet, but the particulars will be filed shortly. James Baird filed the petition.

Sault Ste. Marie Petition.

Bristol, Bayly & Armour, acting for Mr. Miscampbell, applied to the Court of Appeal for an early hearing of the petition against the unseating of Mr. Miscampbell. Owing, however, to the illness of Judge Robertson and Judge Lount, and the fact that two of the judges will be employed on the commission for investigating the Gamey charges, the appeal cannot be heard until the regular sitting of the Court of Appeal on April 14.

Toole and Mrs. Quirk Not Married.

Toronto, March 24.—John Toole of Brantford requests a denial of the report that he and Mrs. James Quirk, widow of the hotel proprietor of that city, who was murdered a year ago, has been married. Toole says he has not married the widow of his late partner, and does not know how the report to that effect was circulated.

Serious Stabbing in Toronto.

Toronto, March 24.—At about 1.50 o'clock this morning Detectives Cuddy and Forrest arrested Christopher McGrain on a charge of stabbing George Williams. McGrain is a man 65 years of age, and lives at 2 Virginia lane. There is slight hope of the wounded man's recovery.

Quebec Losses, Ontario Wins.

New York, March 24.—The Board of Classification of the United States General Appraisers yesterday decided the Canadian wood pulp case. In the Quebec case, the collector was upheld, but the reverse was decided in the case from Ontario.

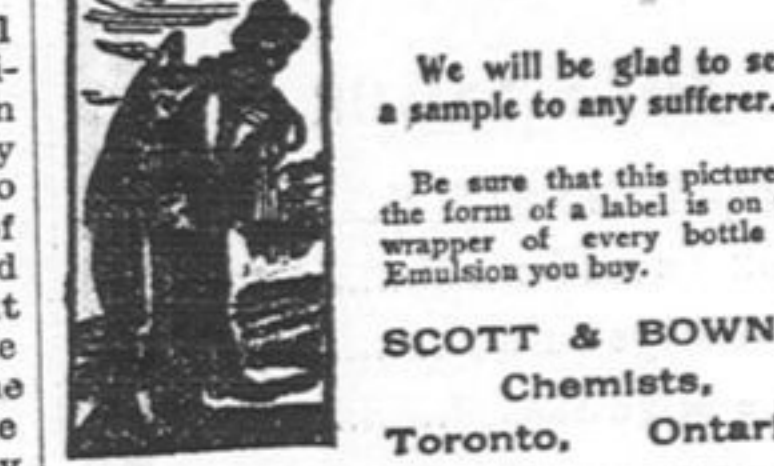
